The delegates present were all "Republicans," most of them local politicians. Resolved, That we, the representatives of Pennsylvania, in convention assembled, having full confidence in the wisdom and loyalty of Congress, and only means of securing the rights ested, the responsibility for which, afrebellion, and upheld the just and loyal powers of the government, do hereby nominate him for President of these United States.
