CAUTION .- As the postoffice regulations are not understood, as to the illegality and penalty for carrying letters or other mailable matter, outside the mail by mail carriers, it is proper that the following extrats from the post-office regulations should be published:

"Mail-carriers, contractors or drivers, cannot lawfully carry out of the mail any letter or packet unless the same has been prepaid by a stamped envelope of suitable denomination."

"Letters, prepaid by stamps, cannot lawfully be carried out of the mails," Violations of these provisions render contractors, conductors, and stage drivers liable to prosecution and a heavy

If a letter is endorsed in a stamped envelope, a mail-carrier can carry and deliver it. He cannot do so if the letter is paid by stamp. Persons who wish to send letters by stage drivers, should note the difference.
