Andrew Johnson, who has not attempted to use a tithe of the authority actually exerted by Andrew Jackson? Because, first, the conspirators are corrupt and reckless, caring nothing for the example they set and aiming only to secure the patronage of the government; secondly, because the lethargy of the people is counted on as insuring the safety and success of the conspiracy.
