If this is done, the other half can be raised outside of Bedford, and the road put under contract this coming spring. The committee are no more interested in this than any other individuals. The books are still open at the Prothonotary's office, and it remains to be seen whether our citizens will allow our town and vicinity to become dried up, and the Bedford Springs get to be nowhere, or whether we shall rival Altoona and Saratoga. Upon our own people, at this particular time, these things depend.
