even if the revolutionists were able to pass it through the prescribed forms and put it into practicle effect, its validity, if it had any, would not result from the legitimate right of amending the Constitution, but upon the despotic priciple that might makes right.

Another general principle which operates as a restraint upon the right of amendment is explicitly expressed in article ten of the amendments, which declares: "The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution nor prohibited by it to the States are reserved to the States respectively or to the people." And Section eight of that instrument sets forth plainly what powers were delegated to the law making power of the United States, as well as those prohibited by the States, and nowhere and at no place, or under no construction, can there be found authority for this attempted usurpation of the reserved rights of the States .--The question of suffrage-the elective franchise-to which this proposed amendment relates, is precisely one of those questions which have been "reserved to the States respectively or to the people." By no word or sylable .Government been invested with any power or authority in regard to this subject. The two houses of Congress, even by a unanimous vote, have no more constitutional right or power to propose such an amendment-no, not amendment but revolution-as that which we have under consideration. than the Parliament of Great Britain. the Corps Legislatiff of France or the Cortes of Spain.
