But the will of the people of Virginia, expressed according to the forms provided by the reconstruction acts and President Grant, is about to be set at naught. The test oath, defeated at the election by permission of Congress and the President, is to be enforced in the qualification of the newly elected members of the legislature. The Virginians, white and black, have voted it down, but Boutwell, Cresswell and company have determined to annul the popular decision. A large majority of the legislature is composed of adherents of Walker, the newly elected Governor.
