That every person excepting Justices of the Peace who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the United States, or of this State, or any city or corporated district, whether a commissioned officer or otherwise, a subordinate officer or agent who is or shall be employed under the legislative, executive or judiciary department of this State, or of any city, or of any incorporated district, and also, that every member of Congress and of the State Legislature, and of the select or common council of any city, or commissioners of any incorporated district, is by law incapable of holding, or exercising at the time, the office or appointment of Judge, Inspector or Clerk of any election of this Commonwealth, and that no Inspector, Judge or other officer of such election shall be elegible to be then voted for. And in case the person who shall have received the highest number of votes for Judge shall have received the highest number of votes for Inspector shall not attend, the person 'elected Judge shall appoint an Inspector in his place; and in case the person elected a Judge shall not attend, then the Inspector who received the highest number of votes shall appoint a Judge in his place; and if any vacaney shall continue in the board for the space of one hour after the time fixed by law for the opening of the election the qualified voters of the township, ward or district for which such officer shall have been elected, present at the place of election, shall elect one of their number to fill such vacancy.

"The following shall be the form of the oath or affirmation to be taken by each inspector, viz: 'I (A. B.) do—that I will duly attend to the ensuing election during the continuance thereof, as an inspector, and that I will not receive any ticket or vote from any person, other than such as I shall farmly believe to be, according to the provisions of the constitution and the laws of this commonwealth, entitled to vote at such election, without requiring such evidence of the right to vote as is directed by law, nor will I vexatiously delay or refuse to receive any vote from any person who I shall believe to be entitled to vote as aforesaid, but that I will in all things truly, impartially and faithfully perform my duty therein, to the best of my judgment and abilities, and that I am not directly, nor indirectly, interested in any bet, or wager on the result of this election.

"The following shall be the oath or affirmation of each judge, viz: 'I (A. B.) do—that I will not give my consent that any vote or ticket shall be received from any person other than such as I firmly believe to be, according to the provisions of the constitution and laws of this centur

Election officers will take notice that the act entitled "A Further Supplement to the Election Laws of this commonwealth," disqualifying deserters from the army of the United States from voing, has recently been declared unconstitutional by the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania, is now null and twoid, and that all persons formerly disquallfied thereunder are now lawful voters, if onerwise qualified. The act decided unconstitutional by the Supreme Court provided as follows:
"A PUBLIER SUPPLEMENT TO THE ELECTION LAWS OF THE COMMONWALL PR Whereas, By the act of the congress of the U-nited States, entitled "An Act to amend the sev-eral acts heretofore passed, to provide for the en-rolling and calling out the national forces, and for sons who have deserted the military or naval ser-vice of the United States, and who have not been

thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, all persons who have descried the military or naval service of the United States, and who have not been discharged, or relieved from the penalty, or disability therein provided, are deemed, and taken to have voluntarily relinquished, and forfeited, their rights of citizenship, and their rights to become citizens, and are deprived of exervising any rights of citizens thereof:

And whereas, persons, not citizens of the United States, are not, under the constitution and laws of Pennsylvania, qualified electors of this commonwealth:

Section I. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That in all elections hereafter to be held in this commonwealth, it shall be unlawful for the judge or inspectors of any such election to receive any ballet, or ballots, from any person, or persons, embraced in the provisions, and subject to the disability, imposed by said act of congress, approved March third, one thousand eight hundred and sixty-five, and it shall be unlawful for any such person to offer to vote any ballot, or ballots. Section 2. That if any such judge and inspectors of election, or any one of them shall receive, or consent to receive, any such unlawful ballot, or hallots, from any such disqualified person, he, or they, so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and, upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this commonwealth, he shall, for each offence, be sentenced to pay a fine of not less than one hundred dollars, and to undergo an imprisonment, in the jail of the proper county, for not less than sixty days.

Section 3. That if any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, shall, at any election, hereafter to be held in this commonwealth, vote, or tender to the officers thereof, and offer to vote, a ballots, or ballots, any person, so offending, shall be deemed guity of a misdemennor, and on envictio

That if any person shall hereafter persuade, or advise, any person, or persons, deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, to offer any ballot, or ballots, to the officers of any election, hereafter to be held in this commonwealth, or shall persuade, or advise, any such officer to receive any ballot, or ballots, from any person deprived of citizenship, and disqualified as aforesaid, such person, so offending, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, in any court of quarter sessions of this commonwatch, shall be manished in like manner as is proty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereor, in any court of quarter sessions of this common-wealth, shall be punished in like manner as is provided in the second section of this act, in the case of officers of such election receiving such unlawfulballot, or ballots.
