FURTHER PARTICULARS.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Oct. 2.-The morning papers give the number killed by the boiler explosion at the State Fair, yesterday, as 27, the wounded, as 56. The wounded doubtless exceeds that number, as many were taken immediately to their homes and no report has been made of them. The most dangerously wounded were taken to the Indiana Surgical Institute.

It seems to be the general opinion that the cause of the explosion was a want of water in the boiler. The Coroner's Jury are in session to-day, but have not rendered the verdict. Five horses were killed by the explosion.
