TRIPLE MURDER IN HUNTINGDON Boy Shot .- Their Bodies Committed to the Flames .- The Perpetrators of the Horrible Crime Captured .- One of the most horrible and inhuman murders ever committed, was perpetrated at Pleasant Grove, a quiet place about seven miles from Huntingdon, on the Huntingdon and Broad Top Railroad, on last Wednesday evening. In an humble house there lived an aged man named Peightal, his wife and a boy who had been placed in their care by his mother, the widow of a soldier. A telegram was promptly sent to Altoona, and when the train arrived at that place two suspicious looking characters were arrested who turned out to be the perpetrators of the fiendish crime.
