It is only seventeen hundred dollars, a sum entirely insuficient to command the services of any responsible man, who is required to furnish a bond with good and approved securities, for eighty thousand dollars, and to run the risk of handling at least five or six million of dollars perannum, without the unlawful use of the State funds, and subsidies from sources that dare not be revealed to the public, because they are positively prehibited by law, under penalties of no ordinary magnitude.
