CENSUS TAKERS .- Many of our exchanges speak of a flutter among applicants for appointment as census-takers. Applicants are numerous, and the marshals of the different districts are likely to be importuned for some time to come. Congress having rejected the new plan proposed, the census for this year will be taken on the same bacis as in 1850 and 1860. The assistants are appointed by the marshals, and the enumeration having to be commenced on the first day of June, and the census completed and the returns all sent in to the Secretary of the Interior by the first of November, is causing some activity on the part of the marshals and stirring up anxious applicants for assistant marshalships. Each State is divided into census districts, to be composed of not less than twenty thousand persons, and the enumerator being paid two cents for every name taken, ten cents for every farm, fifteen eents for every productive establishment of industry, two cents for every deceased person, and two per cent. of the gross amount for names enumerated for social statistics, and ten cents per mile for travel, the compensation of assistants will be from \$600 to \$1,000. This makes it a rather desirable job, and induces many to work hard to procure the position.
