REPLY. NEW YORK CITY, Oct. 15th, 1878. Dear Sir—Your letter of the 8th came to my home when I was absent. I take the earliest unengaged moment to answer its interrogations, and in this is the order you propound them.

1st. To the best of my knowledge and belief Gov. Curtin had no lot or part in the illegal and arbitrary arrest of Democrats for the expression of their rights as free citizens during the war. He threw the whole moral and physical power of the state into the course of the war, but he never engaged in or encouraged the outrages upon personal liberty which were so common to those evil days.
