FRIGHTFUL DISASTER.

A TUNNEL ON A CALIFORNIA RAILROAD WRECKED BY AN EXPLOSION.

Thirty Chinamen Killed and a Large Number Horribly Burned. Terrible Scenery of Suffering and Ruin Around the Mouth of the Tunnel.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 18.—An explosion occurred in tunnel No. 3 on the Narrow Gauge railroad from San Jose to Santa Cruz, early this morning.

There is a terrible scene of suffering in the camp and ruin all around the mouth of the tunnel. The engine for air was disabled, the pipes are broken, sheds wrecked and broken timbers scattered all around.
