An Attempt to Kill the Czar.

A Plan to Mine the Winter Palace and Kill the Imperial Family.

LONDON, Feb. 18.-A dispatch to Reuter's Telegram Company from St. Mrs. Shaffer, washing for pris-Petersburg, says there has been an abortive a tempt made to kill the Imperial family by laying a mine in the Winter Palace. Five soldiers were killed and thirty-five wounded.

A later-dispatch from St. Petersburg reports that the mine was laid under the guard room of the Winter Palace, which is immediately under the duning hall. Owing to accidental delay the Imperial family had not entered the latter at the usual time. The explosion made a hole in the floor of the din ing hall ten feet long and six feet wide.

The Winter Palace is the largest palace in the world. It occupies the site of the one destroyed by fire in 1837, and not the least remarkable fact connected with it is that its present form was the work of but two years. Its front is toward the Neva, 700 feet in length. It is in the form of a vast square, the angles of which nearly cor respond to the four cardinal points. The palace is unequaled in splendor. malachite and pictures.

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


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
