Liquor Legislation.

Ex Chief Justice Agnew has prepared the following amendment to the constitution of Pennsylvania: ARTICLE XIX.

SEC. 1. The manufacture and sale of all intoxicating liquors are forever probibited within this commonwealth, except for medicinal, mechanical, and scientific purposes, and the legislature shall enforce this provision by adequate laws and penalties.

SEC. 2. The manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors for the purposes excepted in the preceding section, shall be regulated by law.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C. Jan. 29th, '81. If the week from January 22 to 29. should be battled out of the history of Congress the public business would not grievously set back. One day was given to the electoral resolution, which was not passed, and another yesterday to a heated political discussion over a small claim. The appropriation bills made no progress in the House and little in the Senate. In the Committee on Commerce of the House an agreement was reached to ald \$1,000,000 to the River and Harbor bill for expenditure on the Mississippi River. There have been earnest discussions in committee on the several propositions to construct canals or a ship railway from the Atlantic to the Pacific, but no report has been made.

The prospect of an agreement between the two Houses on a funding bill is better than a week ago, and probably the bill, when passed, will provide for long time bon'ls at 31 Per

There is little hope now of passing more than the appropriation bills, and the funding bill. Mr. Cox is sanguine of getting a re-apportienment bill through, but that is because Mr. Cox is the most sanguine of legislators. The Republicans improve every opportunity for political discussion, especially where there is a chance to allude to "Rebel Brigadiers," and to the civil war, and resort to fillibustering and semi-revolutionary tastics whenever any measure is proposed which does not exactly suit them. They are determined-the Radicals among themthe country shall be in a ferment when the new administration comes in. This is desired chiefly because of the influence it will perhaps have on President Garfield. They wish to start him in the same narrow ruts in which Grant moved so regularly and into which they forced Hayes so speedily. Inconsiderate Democrats are aiding these enemies of good government.

There are however, further signs of conflict within the Republican party itself, to spring from dissatisfaction at General Garfield's Cabinet selections. The rumors all point to Conkling, as they have done ever since Blaine was named for Secretary of State. So well confirmed are the latter stories, that Garfield's Washington friends are said to have advised him to come here as soon as the Presidential vote is declared, and consult personally with Congressmen from all sections.
