The number of emigrants now arriving is large enough to excite comment. Last year the total number was 327,371, but the number for the first three months of this year exceeded that for the corresponding period of last year by ten thousand. If this rate of increase is maintained throughout it will bring the total immigration of the year well up to half a million.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C., April 23, '81. There are a number of sensations in Washington affairs just now. It is said, and this is most important, that President Garfield has energetically expressed his desire for the transaction of executive business, and that Republican Senators have agreed to hold a caucus next week to consider the subject. It will be urged by some Republican Senators that to proceed to such business is not to back down from their present position and by others to do so would exactly that I think the caucus will be held, and that the consideration of nominations and treaties with Foreign Governments will take the place of discussions and votes on the Mahone treaty.

the Republicans insist on returning to the dry subject of electing a Secretary and Sergeant-at-Arms.

The Star sensation—and it is the greatest for some years, is caused by changes, and rumored changes in Post Office Department officials. Speaking with some personal knowledge of Gen. Brady, just driven out of the department, and some acquaintance with the methods of transacting business in the Department, I have no hesitation in saying that nine tenths of the stories of fraud are false. Neither the Post-Office Department nor any other has been properly conducted for many years, if ever, and irregularities are perpetually sanctioned in all of them that would drive any business man in the world to ruin.

It is a much discussed question among thinking men how much damage to the Republican party an exposure of inefficiency and irregularity in most of the departments will cause. The best opinion is, that it will do more to rattle the party than all the quarrels that are going on between leaders. The speech of Senator Fry on Wednesday last, caused almost a sensation also. It was thought by some to have been delivered after a full consultation between Secretary Blaine and Senator Frye, even if the President had not sanctioned it.
