'The Governor's reason for calling the extra session are sound and logi-

cal and he will be fully sustained by fair-minded people of all parties. He says in his call among other things:

The constitution commands the general assembly "immediately after each state decennial census," to apportion the state into senatorial and representative districts. The imperative mandate has not been obeyed. By the joint rules of your house the time has gone by when any bills disclosing a purpose to perform this daty can be presented to me for approval.

The obligation is imposed upon the governor to "take care that the laws be faithfully executed." I deem it my dety, therefore, to exhaust my lawful authority to correct the grave de-

fault of the legislature. Equally important and necessary, though not o specifically commanded by law, is the duty of the assembly to apportion the state into congressional and judicial districts. I, therefore designate the apportionment of the state into sentorial, representative, congressional and judi ial districts, as subjects for legislative considera-

In addressing ourselves to these subjects w must keep constantly in view the guide provided in the constitution directing that the legislative districts shall be "composed of compact and contiguous territory as nearly equal in population as may be." This is a plain and simple rule

The house placed a prohibition on this payment by the state of republican campaign expense by passing the bill amending the provisions of section three of an act approved February 12. 1876, an act supplementary to the several acts relating to the state treasurer and commissioners of the sinking fund. The bill passed by an almost strictly partisan vote.

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

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

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
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
