Damaged by Storm. The Destruction in Atchison, Kansas—A Terrible Canyon Torrent.

ATCHISON, June 4.—A terrible storm of wind and rain swept over this city yesterday, destroying public and private property to the extent of about \$60,000. All the creeks overflowed their banks, and culverts, bridges and crossings were all swept away or seriously damaged. The gutters and sewers could not carry off the water and the streets on the lower limits became rivers. Cellars were flooded, mills stopped and business generally interrupted. The Mayor and City Engineer, after a careful inspection of public property, say the damages will reach \$50,000 on city works alone, while almost every business man complains of more or less damage by water. The rain came down in a perfect deluge and the thunder and lightning were worse than ever known before in this vicinity.

LONGMONT, Col., June 4.—At noon yesterday the Beaver Park reservoir, in South St. Vrain canyon, burst, causing great damage to the surrounding country. The torrent, which is estimated to have reached a height of 120 feet, rushed down the canyon with terrific force, carrying away bridges, houses, barns and everything which obstructed its path, and flooded the adjacent country. So far as learned no lives were lost. The damage to crops and meadows along the lowlands are very great. The reservoir, an immense affair, covering an area of many acres, supplied water for the highland ditch, which traverses a large section of land adjacent to the mountains.

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THE Republican state convention will assemble at Harrisburg on the 8th of July.

THE house on Tuesday reconsidered its adverse vote on the bill to establish an agricultural experiment station at the State College and passed it finally by a vote of 117 to 42. It now goes to the Governor.

GENERAL GRANT suffered with rheumatic pains in his body and especially in his throat on Sunday night. The pains are accredited to the unfavorable weather conditions attending Sunday night's storm.

THE Supreme Court has lately passed a decision again, making it unlawful to sell life insurance policies. The law forbids any transaction or speculation, which may be based upon the length of a human life.

LATE DISPATCHES from London bring the news of the defeat of Gladstone's ministry in the English House of Commons on Monday evening, on the second reading of the budget and say that in consequence Mr. Gladstone and his cabinet are expected to resign.

TO-MORROW, June 12th, the present session of the legislature will adjourn. It is stated that Governor Pattison intends calling an extra session, immediately after the close of the regular session. The Governor seems to have very decided views on anti-discrimination and wants them discussed at a special session.

THE Grangers' Twelfth Annual Inter-State Pienic-Exhibition for 1885, will be held at William's Greve, Cumberland Co., Penna., from August 31st to Sept. 5th, 1885. This gathering of Agriculturists, Horticulturists, Stockmen and Manufacturers of farming implements was a grand success last year and the attendance then was estimated at 100,000. All the exhibitors of 1884 have engaged space for this year's exhibition and the success promises to be come even greater than last year.

REDUCING the expenses of the governments of this country is a work which seems to be carried on with a will under the new administration and the promises made by President Cleveland in his platform regarding this part of reform are thereby nobly redeemed. The accumulation of unnecessary clerks and officials for the sake of hungry politicians has come to an end and in all departments a general cleaning out of superfluous people in service is going on, the force being reduced to a number which will suffice to do the public work satisfactory.

To Reorganize the Pension Service.

WASHINGTON, June 6.—There will be a complete reorganization of the pension system under the new Commissioner. It will affect Pennsylvania first in a rearrangement of Pension Surgeons. An entirely new list of Pension Surgeons is thought necessary. A complete list is being made out, under the superintendence of Governor Curtin, Mr. Sowden, Mr. Randall and the other Democratic members of Congress from the State. A call was made by these gentlemen upon Commissioner Black to-day in regard to the matter. At the same time a strong letter was presented indorsing General Davis for the Philadelphia Pension agency.
