Crossing Tragedies.

Five Young Lives Crushed Out by Two Terrible Accidents.

Special to the Harrisburg Patriot. CHAMBERSBURG, Oct. 1.—An accident, peculiarly sad in its character, happened near this place about seven o'clock this morning. Mr. D. K. Appenzeller, a member of the firm of J. Hade & Co., the leading dry goods firm of this town, was taking his daily morning ride in a trotting buggy, accompanied by two of his sons. A few feet beyond a crossing of the Baltimore and Cumberland Valley Railroad, just outside the borough limits, the horse he was driving stopped and could not be urged forward. A loud whistle signalled the approach of a train and Mr. Appenzeller jumped from the buggy and took the horse by the head. As the train dashed around a curve a short distance away the animal backed and the buggy, in which the two boys were sitting, was pushed on the track. Before the horse could be moved from his position the engine had struck the buggy and the boys were tossed upon the pilot. The youngest was struck upon the back of his head and his head crushed, death resulting instantly. The other was thrown upon the track, and in addition to a deep gash cut in his head one of his feet was cut off by the wheels. He is still living but his limb was amputated this afternoon.

A Boy and His Sisters Fatally Injured.

HARTFORD, Conn., Oct. 1.—At 3.30 o'clock this morning a train on the New York and New England Railroad, from Waterbury to Hartford, struck an omnibus in New Britain at the Black Rock grade crossing. It was occupied by children on their way to school.

Charles Dyson, aged nineteen years, the driver of the omnibus, and his sisters Minnie and Lottie, aged thirteen and fifteen years respectively, were so badly injured that one has since died, and the other will probably die. They were the children of the owner of the omnibus. The engineer says that the horses became unmanageable and ran upon the track in front of the locomotive.

A Fast Young Man Abstracts \$2000 From the Renovo Postoffice.

RENOVO, Pa., Oct. 4.—Quite a sensation was created yesterday afternoon, growing out of a heavy defalcation in the post-office. It involves a popular and prominent young man, married only a few days ago. Every possible effort has been made to withhold the particulars from the public, and local papers have been induced not to publish the facts. The disclosures connected with the defalcation were whispered about since Tuesday, but it was difficult to determine any thing definitely.
