SERVIA DECLARES WAR.

A Formal Announcement of Hostilities With Bulgaria—The Situation in Roumelia.

LONDON, Nov. 14.—Servia has declared war against Bulgaria. PHILIPPOPOLIS, Nov. 13.—Seventy-five thousand men have been raised in Eastern Roumelia.

The government has information that the bulk of the Servian army has marched to Lesocovic and Vrania and is facing the Turks.

PARIS, Nov. 13.—It is reported from Nissa that all the powers, except England, have suspended relations with Bulgaria.

RUSTCHUK, Nov. 13.—Persistent reports are current to the effect that Russia intends to withdraw her Consuls from Bulgaria.

BELGRADE, Nov. 17.—The Servian Government has called out the second and third corps of reserves.
