GEN. HANCOCK having died poor and having left his wife in comparatively straightened circumstances, the American people's generosity is called upon to lend a helping hand. New York and Philadelphia have already initiated the movement by liberal subscriptions and Harrisburg and other cities are following suit.

HORATIO SEYMOUR DEAD. CLOSE OF A LONG, HONORED EVENTFUL CAREER.

A Politician from His Youth, Twice Governor of New York and Once Democratic Candidate for the Presidency.

UTICA, N. Y., Feb. 12 .- Ex-Goyernor Seymour died at exactly 10 o'. clock to-night at the residence of his sister, Mrs. Roscoe Conkling. He began to fail perceptibly at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Shortly afterward, owing to stimulants being administered to him, he rallied a little but soon relapsed into total unconsciousness. During his illness he experienced little, if any, physical suffering and to-day was wholly without pain. Mrs. Seymour, who is very ill, sat with her husband during joke, but her evident terror soon conthe afternoon. Most of the time the ex-governor rested peacefully and his conditon could only be distinguished from a natural sleep by the ashen pallor of his countenance and his labored

breathing. At half-past 8 he was sinking rapidly, his pulse could scarcely be counted and the respiration was more difficult. He expired without a struggle and as peacefully as if falling asleep. The immediate cause of his death was cerebral effusion, the usual process of death in old age. Those present when he passed away were Mrs. Seymous and her sister, Mrs. Nelson, of New Brunswick, N. J., the ex-governor's brother, John

F. Seymour, of Utica: his sisters, Mrs. Linculaer and Mrs. Conkling, Dr. W. E. Ford and Judge Buler.

UTICA, Feb. 13 .- The funeral of Ex-Governor Seymour will take place from Trinity Church, Utica, at 2 P. M. on Tuesday, February 16. THE following article from the Philadelphia Record contains a few strong and warning points as to the reckless clearing of our forests which is going on by means of saw mills at present :

The flow of water in the Schuylkill River during the summer season has been reduced in volume one-half during the past sixty years. This is the result of cutting away the forests in the highlands in which it finds its source. The winter and spring rainfall, instead of being held back in the spongy upper soil of the woods, falls on the denuded hillsides and plunges at once into the water courses, filling them and rushing to the sea in devastating floods. The water which should have been a part of our supply during the hot months has just gone tearing past us in a soon-subsiding fied buyers. torrent. With more tree cutting and no tree-planting our floods will be come more serious and our summer water-famines more lasting.


