The Lehigh Strikers Have Issued an Appeal to the Public for Aid.

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 5 .- The committee on appeal of the striking Lehigh Valley coal miners Sunday night issued an appeal to the public in which they relate at length the history of the many efforts of the miners during the past two years, to secure arbitration on their demands for increased wages and the positive refusal of the operators to grant the requests for a conference. They state that the officials of the Philadelphia and Reading coal and iron company met the representatives of the employes of that company, and the result was a satisfactory compromise by which the miners received an advance of eight per cent. In conclusion, the address savs:

"During all this time the operators coal and navigation company, the Lehigh Valley company and the Mineral Mining company refused to meet committee appointed by organized labor, and resisted any claims made to an advance. All efforts to arbitrate the question on the part of the miners proved useless, and the public sympathy is now appealed to interfere in behalf of suffering labor.

WANT A NEW ORGANIZATION. Chicago's Rebellious Knights Trying

to Organize Another Order of the K. of L.

CHICAGO, Dec. 2. - The chief movers

in the attempt to organize another order of Knights of Labor have issued a circular addressed to the local assem blies of the Knights of Labor in Cook county, requesting them to co-perate in reorganizing the order on an honest and substantial basis. The plan is for each assembly to refuse to pay further an itemized account of the receipts and expenditures of the general assembly be presented to the local assemblies. The circular is sent out from the headquart ers of the provisional committee, of which Charles F. Seib is secretary. In the preamble the members of the committee say that they wish to sever their connection with the order, because they are "indignant at the usurpation of power, the gross violations of the laws of our order by those high in authority; disgusted with those whose loyalty to the present ring has been gained by the pickings they receive as a reward for their service; incensed at the fawning sycophants who crawl on their knees in slavish submission to the most corrupt, the most hypocritical, the most autocratic and tyrannical clique that ever

The operation lasted fully an hour, and resulted in a most satisfactory man ner. The whole network of nerves in the check was not destroyed, as that would be impossible, but the main diseased parts were removed, so that the patient will not probably again experience the excruciating torture of acute neuralgia in the part, although he will not have the control as formerly over that side of his face.


