### A Ground Plan

OF THE  
**City Philadelphia,**  
AND ITS ENVIRONS.

Taken from a real survey, by **A. P. FOLIE,**  
Geographer, from St. Domingo.

**T**HIS Plan will be engraved on a plate 26 inches square; and it will contain an exact description of all the squares, streets and alleys in the City and Liberties. The situation of the several public buildings, such as the State-House, City-Hall, Seat of Congress, Churches, Meeting-Houses, Hospital, Library and Seminaries of Learning—of the several Banks, and of the Federal and State Offices, will be ascertained. The parts which are built on will be distinguished from those that are not. The courses of the rivulets between Delaware and Schuylkill, and as much of the Canal, intended to connect the navigation of these two waters, as lies within the compass of the draught, will be accurately delineated. It will also be ornamented by a view of the shipping in the harbor, and an elevation of Congress-Hall, and of the other public buildings that occupy the ground contiguous. In short, nothing will be omitted to render this useful and desirable work acceptable to an enlightened public, that is in the author's power; and it shall be completed with the greatest possible dispatch, as soon as the generous encouragement of subscribers shall insure to the author such a sum as will be sufficient to defray expenses.

A Pamphlet will be delivered with each Plan, which will contain an alphabetical list of the Subscribers names, and information concerning the police, population and present state of the city.

The price to subscribers will be Two Dollars and one third, to be paid at the time of delivering the Plans.

### Congress of the United States.

IN SENATE,

Saturday, Feb. 22.

The Senate resumed the consideration of the report of the committee on the petition of Conrad Laub and others, respecting the election of Mr. Gallatin to be a Senator of the United States, and after progress,

On motion,

Ordered, That the further consideration thereof, be postponed until Monday next.

The Vice-President laid before the Senate a report from the Secretary for the department of Treasury, on the expediency of erecting a light house on Cape Hatteras, in the State of North Carolina, together with fundry papers therein referred to, which were read.

On motion,

Ordered, That this report and the papers therein referred to, be committed to Mr. Martin, Mr. Langdon and Mr. King, to consider and report thereon to the Senate.

A motion was made as follows:

“Resolved, That Albert Gallatin returned to this House as a member for the State of Pennsylvania, is duly qualified for, and elected to a seat in the Senate of the United States.”

Ordered, That the consideration of this motion be postponed until Monday next, and that a number of copies of the 4th article of the first confederation of the United States, be printed for the use of the Senate.

The Senate adjourned until Monday next at 11 o'clock.

Monday, Feb. 24.

The Senate resumed the consideration of the motion made on the 22d instant, on the report of the committee on the petition of Conrad Laub and others, respecting the election of Mr. Gallatin, to be a senator of the United States, and after progress

On motion,

Ordered, That the further consideration thereof be postponed until to-morrow. A message from the House of Representatives by Mr. Beckley their clerk:

“Mr. President—The House of Representatives have passed a bill, entitled, “An act making appropriations for the support of government for the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety four,” in which they desire the concurrence of the Senate. And he withdrew.

The following written message was received from the President of the United States by Mr. Dandridge his Secretary.

United States, 24th February 1794.

Gentlemen of the Senate, and of the House of Representatives,

The extracts, which I now lay before you, from a letter of our Minister at London, are supplementary to some of my past communications; and will appear to be of a confidential nature.

I also transmit to you copies of a letter from the Secretary of State, to the Minister Plenipotentiary of his Britannic Majesty, and of the answer thereto, upon the subject of the treaty between the United States and Great Britain; together with the copy of a letter from Messrs. Carmichael and Short, relative to our affairs with Spain; which letter is connected with a former confidential message.

G. WASHINGTON.

The message and papers therein referred to were read.

Ordered, That they lie for consideration.

The Senate adjourned to 11 o'clock to-morrow morning.

Tuesday, February 25th, 1794.

The bill, sent from the House of Representatives for concurrence, entitled, “An act making appropriations for the support of government, for the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety four,” was read the first time.
