The Public are cautioned to beware of counterfeited Five Dollar Bills of the Bank of the United States, and Twenty Dollar Bills of the Bank of North America, feveral of which have appeared in circulation within a few days paft; they are a good general imitation of the genuine Bills, but may be diftinguished by the following

MARKS.

Five Dollar Bills of the Bank of the United States.

ALL that have appeared have the letter F. for their Alphabetical Mark.

The Texture of the Paper is thicker and whiter and it takes the ink more freely than the genuine paper.

The O. in the word Company is smaller

than the M. and other letters of that word, fo that a line extended from the top of the O, to touch the tep of the M. would extend confiderably above the range of the whole word. In the word United the letters are narrow-erand closer together than the rest of the bill. The i and f in the word promise are not parellel, the f inclining much more forward than the i.

The engraving is badly executed, the strokes of all the Letters are stronger and the device in the margin particularly is much coarier and appears darker than in the true bills. Some of the counterfeits bear date in 1791—Whereas the Bank was not in operation till December, and no five dollar bills were iffued in

Twenty Dollar Bills of the Bank of North

America.

ALL that have appeared have the letter B. for their alphabetical mark.

They are printed on a paper nearly fimilar to that of the counterfeit Five Dollar Notes above described; the engraving is better executed, and they approach nearer to the appearance of the genuine bills.

The fine ruled lines through the word Twenty, in the body of the bill, are in number thirteen in the genuine bills, and but twelve in the counterfeits.

The word Company is much like the same word in the Five Dollar Bills as described above, the o being less than the m, and others

There is no stroke to the t in the word North whereas in the genuine bills the stroke is well The letters ent in the word Twenty, to the

left hand at the bottom, do not come down to the line, but are fo cut as to give an irregular appearance to the word, the Tw and the y go-

appearance to the word, the Iw and the y going below them.

The Signature J. Nixon, has the appearance of being written with lamp-black and oil, and differs from the other inks used in printing the bills and the cashier's fignature.

It is supposed these forgeries were committed in some of the Southern States, as all the counterseits that have appeared, have come from thence, and two persons have been apprehended in Virginia, on suspicion of being the authors of them.
