In the word Un ted the letters are narrower and closer together than the rest of the bill. The i and f in the word promise are out parallel, the finclining much more forward than the i.

The engraving is badly executed, the ftrokes of all the Letters are fironger and the devi e in themargin particularly is much coarier and appears darker than in the true bills. Some of the counterfeits bear date in 1791—Whereas the Bank was not in operation till December, and no five dollar bills were iffued in that year.
