The Complainant states

in his bill that the defendants Benjamin Gai-
 ther and Basil Gaither were seized in fee as
 tenants in common of a tract of land in Freder-
 ick County, called Hammond's Strife;—
 that being so seized, Basil executed a power
 of attorney to Benjamin authorizing him to
 sell his, the said Basil's interest in the said
 land, that afterwards the said Benjamin sold
 the said land to a certain William Gaither for
 the consideration of six hundred pounds which
 hath been since paid, that the said William
 hath assigned to the Complainant Henry Rape
 the bond executed by the said Benjamin for
 the conveyance of the said land: The Com-
 plainant now further states (and so appears
 to the Chancellor) that the defendants are
 non-residents of the state of Maryland, and
 therefore out of the reach of the process of
 this court.

It is therefore adjudged and ordered, that
 the Complainant procure a copy of this or-
 der to be inserted in the newspaper of Angell
 and Sullivan, and in the United States Gazette
 at least three weeks successively, before the
 twentieth day of May next; to the intent

The First American Edition.
THE grand principle of Equality, if right-
 ly understood, is the only basis on which
 universal justice, sacred order, and perfect
 freedom, can be firmly built, and permanent-
 ly secured. The view of it exhibited in this
 essay, at the same time that it represses the
 insolence of office, the tyranny of pride, and
 the outrages of oppression; confirms, in the
 most forcible manner, the necessity of subor-
 dination, and the just demands of lawful au-
 thority. So far indeed, from loosening the
 bands of society, that it maintains inviolate
 every natural and every civil distinction
 draws more closely every social tie, unites in
 one harmonious and justly proportioned sys-
 tem, and brings men together on the even
 ground of the inherent rights of human na-
 ture, of reciprocal obligation, and of a com-
 mon relation to the community.

The Public are cautioned to

beware of counterfeit Five Dollar Bills of
 the Bank of the United States, and Twenty
 Dollar Bills of the Bank of North America,
 several of which have appeared in circulation
 within a few days past; they are a good ge-
 neral imitation of the genuine Bills, but may
 be distinguished by the following
MARKS.

Five Dollar Bills of the Bank of the
 United States.
 ALL that have appeared have the letter F
 for their Alphabetical Mark.
 The Texture of the Paper is thicker and
 whiter and it takes the ink more freely than
 the genuine paper.
 The O. in the word Company is smaller
 than the M. and other letters of that word,
 so that a line extended from the top of the O,
 to touch the top of the M. would extend con-
 siderably above the range of the whole word.
 In the word United the letters are narrow-
 er and closer together than the rest of the bill.
 The t and f in the word promise are not
 parallel, the f inclining much more forward
 than the t.

The engraving is badly executed, the strokes
 of all the Letters are stronger and the device
 in the margin particularly is much coarser and
 appears darker than in the true bills. Some
 of the counterfeiters bear date in 1791—Where-
 as the Bank was not in operation till Decem-
 ber, and no five dollar bills were issued in
 that year.

**Twenty Dollar Bills of the Bank of North
 America.**

ALL that have appeared have the letter
 B. for their alphabetical mark.
 They are printed on a paper nearly similar
 to that of the counterfeit Five Dollar Notes
 above described; the engraving is better exe-
 cuted, and they approach nearer to the ap-
 pearance of the genuine bills.
 The fine ruled lines through the word Twen-
 ty, in the body of the bill, are in number thir-
 teen in the genuine bills, and but twelve in
 the counterfeiters.
 The word Company is much like the same
 word in the Five Dollar Bills as described a-
 bove, the o being less than the m, and others
 following.

There is no stroke to the t in the word North
 whereas in the genuine bills the stroke is well
 defined.
 The letters ent in the word Twenty, to the
 left hand at the bottom, do not come down to
 the line, but are so cut as to give an irregular
 appearance to the word, the Tw and the y go-
 ing below them.

The signature J. Nixon, has the appear-
 ance of being written with lamb-black and
 oil, and differs from other inks used in
 printing the bills and the cashier's signature.
 It is supposed these forgeries were committed
 in some of the Southern States, as all the coun-
 terfeits that have appeared, have come from
 thence, and two persons have been apprehend-
 ed in Virginia, on suspicion of being the authors
 of them.

The reward of ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS

 - Every person who has acted as a principal in any other way, in the counterfeiting and uttering the said bills.

Other counterfeit bills

of the Bank of the United States have appeared
 in circulation.
 The denomination is of TWENTY DOL-
 LARS, and the alphabetical mark is the let-
 ter B.
 They may be distinguished from the genu-
 ine by the following MARKS:

The paper of the counterfeiters is of a more
 tend texture and glossier surface than the
 genuine, and there is no water mark in them.
 The letter C. in the word Cashier, in the
 true bills is strongly marked, whereas in the
 counterfeiters, the whole letter is a fine hair
 stroke, evidently in an unfinished state. The
 letter a in the word demand, is badly formed
 and the whole word ill done, and there is no
 comma at the end of it, as there is in the
 genuine bills.

The marginal device, is much darker in
 the false, than in the genuine bills, owing to
 the shade strokes being coarser, much nearer
 together, and consequently much more num-
 erous. This difference strikes the eye at first
 view.
 The same reward of ONE THOUSAND
 DOLLARS, will be paid for apprehending, &c.
 prosecuting to conviction the several above
 described offenders in respect to this, as to
 the last described bills.
