APPROPRIATION.
WHEREAS the Congress of the United States, at
the first session of the fourth Congress, to wit, on
the twelfth day of May last past, passed an act, to repeal
so much of an act, intitled "an act to establish the
Judicial Courts of the United States", as directs that the
alternate sessions of the Circuit Court for the District
of Pennsylvania, shall be holden at Yorktown; and for other
purposes, in the following words, to wit:

Fourth Congress of the United States:
At the first session, begun and held at the city of Phila-
delphia, in the State of Pennsylvania, on Monday, the
seventh of December, one thousand seven hundred and
ninety-five.

An act to repeal so much of an act, intitled "an act to
establish the judicial courts of the United States", as di-
rects that alternate sessions of the said circuit court for
the district of Pennsylvania shall be holden at York-
town; and for other purposes.

Sec. 1. BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Re-
presentatives of the United States of America, in Con-
gress assembled, That so much of the fifth section of the
act, intitled "an act to establish the judicial courts of
the United States", as directs that alternate sessions of
the circuit court for the district of Pennsylvania shall be holden
at Yorktown, be, and the same is hereby repealed;
and that all the sessions of the said circuit court shall, from
and after the passing of this act, be holden at the city of
Philadelphia, excepting only, when at any session of the
said court, the judges thereof shall direct the next session
to be holden at Yorktown; which they are hereby autho-
rized and empowered to do, whenever it shall appear to
them to be necessary.

Sec. 2. And be it further enacted, That all such pro-
ceeds of the said court, as may be issued before the pass-
ing of this act, and all recognizances returnable, and all
fines and other proceedings that were continued to the
said circuit court for the district of Pennsylvania, on the
eleventh of October next, in Yorktown, shall now be re-
turned, and held continued, to the same court, on the
same day, at Philadelphia. And to the end that suitors,
witnesses, and all others concerned, may have notice of
the alteration hereby made, the Marshal of the said dis-
trict is hereby required to make the same known, by pro-
clamation, on or before the first day of August next.

at Savannah, until the first day of September next.
1. From Savannah by Sunbury to Newport-Beide, once a
week.
Receive the Mail at Savannah every Saturday by 9 A. M., ar-
rive at Sunbury by 6 P. M., and at Newport Bridge on Sun-
day by 10 A. M. Returning, Leave Newport Bridge on Sun-
day by 5 P. M. and arrive at Sunbury in the evening, and at
Savannah on Monday by 6 P. M.
2. From Newport Bridge by Darien and Brunswick to St.
Mary's, once in two weeks.
Receive the Mail at Newport Bridge every other Sunday
noon, and arrive at St. Mary's the next Wednesday by 5 P. M.
Returning, Leave St. Mary's the next day, Thursday by 8 A.
M., and arrive at Newport Bridge the next Sunday by 10 A. M.

Note 1. If either of the routes are altered by law, during the con-
tinuance of the Contracts, the Contractor is to observe such alterations
in carrying the mail, and his pay is to be increased or diminished, in
