The following flatement of the flrength of the Dutch Navy is translated from a Bruffels paper of the 23d ult.

The Dutch fquadron, gone to the East-Indies, under the command of Admiral Lucas, is compofed of two fhips of 68 guns, one of 56, two frigates of 44, and four corvettes.

The iquadron, gone to the West-Indies under

Admiral Braak, contifts of one fhip of 56 guns, one frigate of 44, two of 36, and four corvettes. There are in the Texel, under the command of admiral Winter, two fhips of 74 guns, fix of 68, one of 56, two frigates of 44, and feven corvettes, or other imaller veffels.

In the other different ports of the Republic, there are two ships of 74 guns, four of 68, two of 56, two of 44, eight trigates or corvettes, of from 36 to 10 guns, and fixteen ships of war of lefs than 20 guns.

There are building or repairing in the different dock yards of the Batavian republic, two fhips of 74 guns, four of 68, one of 56, two frigates of 32, one of 26, and two corvettes of 18.

DOCTORS' COMMON Yefterday came on to be heard the cafe of the

The principal queftion before the court was, "whether a Mr. Apthorpe, who claimed refitu-tion of his share of the cargo as a native of America, ought to be confidered at the time of the capture as an enemy to the crown of England, or as the fubject of a neutral power ?"

It appeared that Mr. Apthorpe had refided at Suinam; that he had concealed certain of the fhip's papers at the time of the capture, and had talked of retaking the fhip.
