1st. That pursuant to an Act of Congress passed on the
28th day of April, 1796, intituled an act in addition to an
act, intituled "An act making further provision for the
support of public credit, and for the redemption of the
public debt," the said debt or Stock will be reimbursed and
paid in manner following, to wit: "First, by dividends
to be made on the last days of March, June and Septem-
ber for the present year, and from the year one thousand
seven hundred and ninety-seven, to the year one thou-
sand eight hundred & eighty-eight inclusive, at the rate of
one and one half per centum upon the original capital.

"Secondly, by dividends to be made on the last day of

thousand seven hundred and ninety-seven, to the year
