there shall at all times during the said term, be sufficient
for the consumption of the troops at each post, and
at least three months in advance, in good and wholesome
provisions, if the same shall be required, it is to be un-
derstood, that the Contractor is to bear the expense and
risk of insuring the supplies to the troops at each post, and
that all losses sustained by the deprivations of an enemy, or
by means of the troops of the United States, shall be paid
for at the price of the article captured or destroyed, on
the depositions of two or more persons of credible cha-
racters, and the certificate of a commissioned officer, as-
certaining the circumstances of the loss, and the amount
of the articles for which compensation shall be claimed.
