Picque Town and Loranies Store; at Fort Adams; at

Steuben; at Fort Mifflin; at any place from Fort Mifflin
to the fourth boundary of the United States on the river
Mississippi; at Fort Knox; at Quantanoo.

at least three months in advance, in good and wholesome
provisions, if the same shall be required. It is to be un-
derstood, that the Contractor is to be at the expence and
risk of supplying the supplies to the troops at each post, and
that all losses sustained by the deprivations of an enemy, or
by means of the troops of the United States, shall be paid
for at the price of the articles captured or destroyed, on
the depositions of two or more persons of credible char-
acters, and the certificate of a commissioned officer, af-
certaining the circumstances of the loss, and the amount
of the articles for which compensation shall be claimed.
