

Minister Adet says—"The flag of the French republic will treat the flag of neutrals, in the same manner as they shall suffer it to be treated by the English."

If the same argument can possibly justify the French in one instance, it will, on the same principle, justify the British.—But, when the British take American vessels, and the capture is illegal, there is an appeal from their court of admiralty to commissioners, delegated by both parties, to arbitrate and determine upon the terms of indemnification.

If these questions cannot be answered in favor of the French, what must every man in his sober senses think of the modesty of a diplomatic appeal to the people of America, through the medium of a newspaper?

Fellow-citizens!—is this calculated, do you think, to excite your friendship, or your indignation? Those who begin to blush at it, now endeavor to apologize it away, by hinting that it is only an electioneering manoeuvre; but sooner would I believe that Dumourier (who is said to be in this country)—or that the young duke of Orleans (who lately arrived at Philadelphia) had brought over minister Adet's letter along with his own passport from the French directory, than attribute the publication of it to any such unminister-like and intermeddling motive with the governmental affairs of our country.
