The Commissioners

FOR carrying into effect the fifth article of the
Treaty of Amity, Commerce and Navigation, con-
cluded between His Britannic Majesty and the United
States of America, on the 19th day of November,
1794, having this day constituted their Board,
pursuant and agreeably to the said Treaty, do hereby
give notice, that they are ready to proceed to
business according to the said Treaty, and that
under the said article (which so far as the same de-
scribes the cases thereby provided for, is hereto
annexed) may be lodged with their Secretary with-
out delay.
They further desire that all such claims may not
only state in what manner the several cases come
within the description of the said article, but also
specify for forth the nature of the evidence by
which the claimants respectively undertake to sub-
stantiate the same.

Extract from the said article,
"Whereas it is alleged by divers British mer-
chants, and others his Majesty's subjects, that
"debts to a considerable amount, which were bona
"fide contracted, before the peace, still remain
"owing to them by citizens or inhabitants of the
"United States; and that by the operation of va-
"rious lawful impediments, since the peace, not
"only the full recovery of the said debts has been
"delayed, but also the value and security thereof
"have been in several instances impaired and in-
"fected, so that by the ordinary course of judi-
"cial proceedings, the British creditors cannot now
"obtain and actually have and receive full and
"adequate compensation for the losses and dama-
"ges which they have thereby sustained: It is a-
"greed that in all such cases where full compen-
"sation for such losses and damages cannot for what-
"ever reason be actually obtained, had and received
"by the said creditors in the ordinary course
"of justice, the United States will make full and
"complete compensation for the time to the said
"creditors: but it is distinctly understood, that
"this provision is to extend to such losses only as
"have been occasioned by the lawful impediments
"aforesaid, and is not to extend to losses occasion-
"ed by such insolvency of the debtors or other
"causes, as would equally have operated to pro-
"duce such loss, if the said impediments had not
"existed; nor to such losses or damages as have
"been occasioned by the manifest delay, or negli-
"gence, or wilful omission of the claimant."

with. The proper description and situation of the
creditor or claimant, and original debtor, respecti-

3d. When, in what manner, and to what extent,
the creditor or claimant was prevented or impeded,
by the provision, operation or defect of law, the
decisions and practice of courts, or restraint of execu-
tion, from recovering payment of the debt in

4th. The loss and damage incurred or sustained,
in consequence of such impediments, whether the
same may have arisen from the insolvency, change of
situation, or death of the debtor, the loss of legal
remedy from lapse of time, or other causes impairing
the value and security of the debt, which would not
have operated if such impediments had not existed.
And 5th. The particular grounds and reasons on
which the claimant insists, in the terms of the
Treaty, that "by the ordinary course of judicial
proceedings, the creditor cannot now obtain and actually
have and receive full and adequate compensation" for
the losses and damages so sustained.
The general agent thinks it his duty further to sug-
gest that the several claims ought to be accompanied
and supported by the affidavit of the claimant's duty
sworn and regularly attested, both as to the existence
of the debts claimed, and such other circumstances
as may be within their own knowledge respectively,

best of which the case is capable) have occasion to
refer to the testimony of witnesses, it will be proper
