To Masters and Pilots bringing up Vessels from Foreign Ports to this City.

Whereas fundry infringements have lately been made on the laws of this state for the proventing pestilential or infestious diseases, either from ignorance or instention thereto, it is those expedient at this time to publish the following extracts from the laws of 22d April, 1794, 7th and 8th sections:

HEALTH-OFFICE.

June 6th, 1794.

Extract of an act for feeting the city and port of Philadelphia from the introduction of postilential and contagious diseases.

Secr. 7. And be it further enacted, that every malter or captain of any ship or voice doming from the (veffels actually employed in the coasting trade excented) and hound to say work.

mafter or captain of any fhip or vallel coming from fea (vessels adually amployed in the coasting trade excepted) and bound to any port or place within the jurisdiction of Pennsylvania, shall cause his ship or vessel to be brought to anchor, or otherwise slayed in the stream of the river Delaware, opposits to the Health-Office on State-Hand aforciaid, and there to remain until he shall have duly obtained a certificate or bill of health from the Resident Physician. And if, previously to obtaining such certificate or bill of health from the Resident Physician. And if, previously to obtaining such certificate or bill of health, any master or captain shall suffer his ship or vessel to apprach generat than the said licalth-Office to the city of Philadelphia, or shall land, cange or suffer to be landed, or brought on shore, at any place or port within this Commonwealth, or at any other port or place, with the intent of being conveyed into this Commonwealth, any person or persons, or any goods, wares or merchandize, or, is after receiving such bill of health or certificate, he shall neglest or result to deliver the same to the Health-Officer, such master or captain shall forfeit and pay, for each and every such offence, the sum of FIVE BUNDRED BOBLARS.

And the captain or master of every ship or vessel shall fend a safe and commodious boat to bring the physician on board, and shall in like manner convey him back to an dealth-Office, after he has concluded his official examination; And while he is making such examination, or in case any subsequent examination by the Health Officer or Consulting Physician, agreeably to the directions of this act, the master or captain shall expose or canle to be exposed to the search of the Resident Physician (as the case may be) each and every part of the ship or vessel said, and shall after to a persons on board thereof, and and shall also true and fatisfactory answers make to all such questions as the Resident Physician, Sec. at the time of examination, be insected with any pertilent orfeit and pay the fum of FIVE HUNDRED DOS-

SECT. 8. And if any person or persons whatsever (the Resident Physician, &c. excepted) shall go on board any vessel, before the master thereof has received a certificate of health in the manner directed, every person so offending, shall pay the um of one hundred dollars.

IP being absolutely necessary that the foregoing sections should be punctually complied with, the subscriber, in compliance with his duty, must exact a rigorous observance of the same, or else be under the necessary of puring the laws in force.
