Whereas sundry infringements have lately been made on the laws of this state for the preventing pestilential or insectious diseases, either from ignorance or inattention thereto, it is thost expedient at this time to publish the following extracts from the laws of 22d April, 1794, 7th and 8th sections:

And be it further enacted, that every matter or captain of any thip or veffel coming from the (veffels actually employed in the coalting trade). caccepted) and bound to any port or place within the jurification of Pennfylvania, shall cause his ship or vessel to be brought to anchor, or otherwise slayed in the stream of the river Delaware, opposite to the Health-Office on State-Island aforesaid, and there to remain until he shall have duly obtained a certificate or bill of heal h from the Resident Physician.
