Sect. 7. And he is further enacted, that every mafter or captain of any fhip or vessel coming from fee (vessels actually employed in the consung from fee (vessels actually employed in the consung from fee (vessels actually employed in the consung that the jurisdesion of Peansylvania, shall cause his ship or vessel to be brought to anchor, or otherwise slayed in the stream of the river Delaware, opposite to the Health-Office on State-Hand aforesaid, and there to remain until he shall have duly obtained a certificate or bill of health from the Resident Physician. And it, previensly to obtaining such certificate or bill of health, any master or captain shall suffer his ship or vessel to approach nearer than the said Health-Office to the city of Philadelphia, or shall land, cause or suffer to be landed, or brought on shore, at any place or port within this Coramonwealth, or at any other port or place, with the intent of being conveyed into this Commonwealth, any person or persons, or any goods, wares or merchandize, or, if aster receiving such bill of health or certificate, he shall neglect or results to deliver the same to the Health-Officer, such master or exprain shall forseit and pry, for each and every such offence, the sum of rive summers Dollars.
