To Masters and Pilots bringing up Vessels from Foreign Ports to this City.

Whereas sundry infringements have lately been made on the laws of this State for the preventing pestiferous or infectious diseases, either from ignorance or inattention thereto, it is the expedient at this time to publish the following extracts from the laws of 22d April, 1794, 7th and 8th sessions.

HEALTH-OFFICE.

Extract of an act for securing the city and ports of Philadelphia from the introduction of pestiferous and contagious diseases. Sect. 7. And be it further enacted, that every master or captain of any ship or vessel coming from sea (vessels actually employed in the coasting trade excepted) and bound to any port or place within the jurisdiction of Pennsylvania.

Extract of an act for securing the city and ports of Philadelphia from the introduction of pestiferous and contagious diseases.

Sect. 7. And be it further enacted, that every master or captain of any ship or vessel coming from sea (vessels actually employed in the coasting trade excepted) and bound to any port or place within the jurisdiction of Pennsylvania, shall cause his ship or vessel to be brought to anchor, or otherwise lay up in the stream of the river Delaware, opposite to the Health-Office on State-Island aforesaid.
