and baggage are as follows: For a passenger from the
Maryland Ferry to Tuckerton, including
14 lb. of baggage, Two Dollars; for way passengers
per mile, Four Cents—150 lb. of baggage equals a pas-
senger. Passage of letters, newspapers, &c. will be
agreedly to them.

The Norfolk Mail Stage.

at the corner of Second and Arch Streets, in
