Sixty Dollars Reward.

tue of an act, passed during the present ses-
sion of Congress, so much of the act entitled
"An Act making further provision for the sup-
port of public credit, and for the redemption
of the public debt"—passed the third day of
March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety-
five, as bars from settlement or allowance,
Certificates, commonly called Loan Office and
final settlement Certificates, and Indents of in-
terests, is suspended until the twelfth day of
June, which will be in the year one thousand seven
hundred and ninety nine.
