The following articles were published in a Postscript to yesterday's Gazette. The intelligence was received at too late an hour to accompany the first thousand of our impression. And as many of our Readers, of course, have not read it, it is for that reason inserted to-day, along with further extracts from London papers. LONDON, October 11. By the Prince of Wales packet, which brought over the mail, dispatches of considerable importance were received from Sir Morton Eden at Vienna. Captain Sutton, the Commander of the packet, came with them himself, and arrived this morning at Lord Grenville's office. These dispatches, we are informed, contain the pleasing confirmation of admiral Nelson having taken 15 sail of the line, some frigates, and 40 transports, and that two fail of the line only had escaped into the port of Malta. The dispatches were immediately forwarded to Lord Grenville at Droppore, and copies of them to Mr. Pitt at Holwood. The news will probably be announced officially by a letter to the Lord Mayor—if in time for post, we shall stop the press to insert it.

This day a mail arrived from Hamburg, which brings some intelligence from Constantinople respecting the French fleet.—According to these accounts, Admiral Nelson found it in the harbor of Alexandria; and the Bay of Begnieres, formerly mentioned as the place of action, is only a little to the eastward of Alexandria; and this disagreement in the accounts does not invalidate the truth of an actio having taken place. Indeed this is confirmed by the accounts from Rhodes, by which it appears that some of the French frigates which had escaped from being captured by our fleet, had been seized by the Turks upon entering that harbour, in consequence of orders previously received from the Porte, which may now be considered as having commenced hostilities against France, or rather as having retaliated on her for the first aggression.

Saturday noon some Dispatches were received at the Duke of Portland's Office, at Whitehall, from the Commandant at Jersey, brought over to the Isle of Wight by the regular packet. Every thing was quiet at that and the other islands when this vessel failed. At St. Maloes and the adjacent sea ports of France, there was a general calm, and no appearance of preparations of any sort. On Saturday, orders were sent to Portsmouth by the Telegraph, for the 44th regiment of foot, quartered at Hiffa barracks to embark immediately on board the Weymouth armed transport, and hold itself in readiness for foreign service.

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DESTRUCTION OF THE FRENCH FLEET IN THE MEDITERRANEAN, BY ADMIRAL NELSON. We stop the press to insert the following letter sent this afternoon, from the Secretary of State's Office, for the information of the Gentlemen of Lloyd's Coffee-house: "Sir MORTON EDEN'S letter of the 15th of last month, gives an account, that the "Mutine cutter had arrived at Naples on the 3d from Sir A. NELSON, and that the Commander had reported that ALL THE FRENCH LINE OF BATTLE SHIPS, excepting two, had either been BURST, SUNK, or DESTROYED. This intelligence had been given to him by the Neapolitan Charge d'Affaires to whom it had been sent from Trieste, by Prince BELMONTE, and who stated that he had received it by a Messenger from Naples."

LAST night arrived his Majesty's ship Eurydice, and Seagull sloop of war, from the coast of France, where, with two gun-vessels they have been eight weeks blocking up in the Isles de Riehat a convoy of 23 vessels, laden with naval stores and gunpowder, bound from St. Maloes to Brest, under escort of a National corvette of 20 guns, and two cutters of 16 guns each, which station they were obliged to quit, being out of water and provisions, a circumstance that it is feared will give the convoy an opportunity of shipping out, and reaching their destined port. CHATHAM, September 27. The Marines are found to be so very useful on board the respective ships that it is thought proper to augment those corps; recruits are accordingly daily coming into the Marine barracks here, in order to be trained to their exercise. SHEERNESS, September 20. Yesterday arrived the Andromache, of 33 guns, captain Mansfield, having under convoy the homeward bound fleet from Elfinore, consisting of 74 sail; also the Circe frigate of 28 guns, captain Winthrop. She has brought in five fail of Greenland ships, and six large Dutch

This conclusion was ratified on the 11th ult. and delivered to the French ministers. The Onoefe have had their 18th Fructidor! The directory has triumphed over the legislative body—ten members of the Great Council, and five of the Council of Elders have been forced to resign. The Swiss inhabitants who had persisted in refusing to take the oaths required by the new ruling power, and had armed in their own defence, were defeated on the 9th ult with great slaughter. The battle was obstinately contested and lasted from 5 in the morning till 6 in the evening. The Amphion frigate, in company with the Speedwell brig, has captured a vessel of about 200 tons burthen, laden with hemp, iron, and other naval stores, bound from Petersburg to Amsterdam, supposed to be worth 10,000l.—The prize is laid at Yarmouth.

The rich Spanish packet Edadd'Oro, taken by the Lord Hawke privateer, at two miles distance from the Lighthouse of Coronna, as proved by the evidence of the Spanish captain and mates, and of course within random shot of the batteries, is become a point of litigation by his majesty's ships La Nympe and Aurora, although nothing more of the frigates than the first reef of the topsails could be seen from the deck of the Lord Hawke at the time, and the weather very clear—the Nympe about 16 miles to the westward and to windward, and the Aurora about the same distance to leeward. During the last week, twenty-eight ships arrived in the port of London from the Leeward Islands. An order has been sent from the admiralty to the port admiral at Spithead, for the usual preparations at the setting in of the winter half year. The harbour nightly rowers are, the approaching season, to be augmented to eight instead of four; the duty to be performed alternately by the boats of the Squadron, and officers from their respective ships. A large gun-boat is to be stationed off St. Helen's Point, and two small cutters to cruise from thence from the close of the day till day light the succeeding morning. In consequence of information having been received by government that the French had prepared several vessels of various descriptions, with combustibles, for the purpose of setting fire to our ships at Spithead, as well as those in the harbor, and to Portsmouth dock-yard, orders have been received by the guardships at St. Helen's, &c. to examine every vessel that arrives, and to detain such as are in the least suspicious. There are now at Cherbourg seventeen gun-brigs, eighteen flats, and one corvette ready for sea, besides several vessels of various descriptions in preparation. Almost every day the greater number of the prepared armament manœuvre within the Coes—but, though the Camilla, of 20 guns, has in general been the only vessel we have had off that port, they have not ventured out to attack her. They have of late frequently exchanged shot with her, but never out of reach of their batteries. The French force at Havre is daily increasing, and will doubtless be speedily much augmented, in consequence of the arrival of a convoy yesterday week, which comprised five ships, said to be laden with naval stores. On the late approaches of our ships to Havre, the enemy formed two lines, the first consisting of five frigates, with two other heavy ships, and the second line containing two large corvettes and several smaller vessels.

CORK, September 23. An express has arrived from Bantry, mentioning that an English frigate arrived there, the captain of which states, that he had defeated at sea, a French fleet consisting of two ships of the line, and seven frigates steering to the westward. He said he had left a sloop of war to watch their motions, while he came with intelligence respecting them to admiral Kingmill.

PLYMOUTH, September 29. This morning arrived in Cawsand Bay, his Majesty's ship STAG, of 32 guns, Captain YORK, and the AMBUCADE, of 32 guns, Captain JENKINS; these are the ships which were left dodging the French fleet that lately failed from Brest, but we have not yet heard any particulars respecting them.

They contain 56 whales, and large quantities of blubber. Sailed the Victor sloop, of 18 guns, captain Renzie, for Harwich, to be repaired; and the Nerva Russian ship, of 32 guns, for Warrmouth to proceed thence to join Lord Duncan's fleet.

BALLINA, September 24. We have been here for some time in the greatest dread of being destroyed by the rebels; but now, thank God, we are extricated from those fears—A fore defeat has been given to the deluded wretches by his majesty's army, in which above 1,000 of them were killed between this place and Foxford. In this vicinity they had committed great depredation. On entering houses they first drank any wine they could get, then destroyed the furniture, and went the gardens, and afterwards carried off all plunder that was portable to Killala. They were going to hang CALONEL, whose house they plundered. Some of the French who lately landed at Killala were found among them, and are now prisoners. Rastat Sept. 12. The Deputation of the Empire, on the 10th, voted its conclusion in answer to the last French note, which is the same in substance that it was expected to be: The Deputation consents to cede the island Pter's Ave, but requires the restoration of Kehl and Castell. This conclusion was, on the 11th, ratified, and delivered as a note to the French Minister, by the Austrian Plenipotentiary. The latter, however still declares that Austria will never consent to any demand on the right bank of the Rhine, nor accede to any such concession by the Deputation. GENOA, Sept. 1. We have now likewise had our 18th of Fructidor. Yesterday ten Members of our Great Council, and five of the Council of Elders, were obliged to resign their posts. The dispute between the Legislative Body and the Directory is thus ended with a complete triumph on the part of the latter. BASLE, Sept. 11. The inhabitants of the Canton of Underwald, determined to persist in their refusal of taking the oaths, intrenched themselves in a very advantageous situation near Stantz where, on the 9th inst. they were attacked by General Schauenberg, with a large train of artillery. One body of French crossed the lake and landed near Stantz, and another marched over the mountains, by which means the insurgents were surrounded; they however defended themselves with the most obstinate valour. At length, notwithstanding, they were obliged to give way, and all their artillery, ammunition, &c. fell into the hands of the victors; their loss is estimated at 1,500 besides wounded. The town of Stantz was almost wholly destroyed. The following is General Schauenberg's letter: Head-quarters, Lucern, July 9th 6 h. 15 m. P. M. "You will learn with pleasure, citizen directors, that victory has remained faithful to the republicans. We have occupied the district of Stantz, after a battle which lasted from five o'clock this morning until now: all that afflicts me is that this day has cost much blood, but we had to do with rebels, whom it was necessary to reduce.—Health and consideration. (Signed) "SCHAUENBERG." The general is now about to enter the Canton of Schwitz. He has published, that if the inhabitants surrender at discretion, the troops shall preserve good order; but that if they make the least resistance, they shall be treated as were those of Underwald. In a note lately delivered to the councils of the Grifons, is the following remarkable passage: "Baron Cronthal, Imperial Charge d'Affaires, has assured us, amicably and officially, that the Emperor was resolved to interpose in favour of the independence of the Grifcon league, and of the maintenance of their laws—that he would take under his protection those who defend his independence, especially if he was desired to do so by the three leagues united."

HUNGARY, September 9. The accounts received from Semlin that the Porte on the 18th of August had declared war, against France, at Constantinople, with the usual ceremonies by hoisting the bloody flag, is premature. Orders have, however, been sent through all the Turkish provinces, requiring, in the name of God and the Prophet, all Musselmen capable of bearing arms, to repair to the standard, and assist in defending the just cause of the Porte. A Tartar has arrived with this declaration at Belgrade, where the war banner is already displayed. According to these letters, the exportation of provisions from the Turkish Empire is forbidden; and large magazines of provisions and forage will be established.
