KINGSTON (Jam.) Dec. 1.
The French cartel schooner Two Sisters,
capt. Paudraux, in 4 days from the Mole,
arrived at Port-Royal on Saturday evening.
Lieut. col. Porter is arrived in her, with
dispatches from gen. Touffaint to Lord Bal-
carres and admiral Parker.
By the Judith, in 4 days from Cuba, in-
formation is received, that the brig Conquest,
capt. Glegg, of this port, was attacked and
captured on the 12th of Oct. by two privateer
schooners off the Isle Pines; one of
them mounting 1, the other 7 guns 6 pound-
ers. The largest was beat off, but captain
Glegg had then received a musket shot thro'
both legs, and when veering his vessel, he
received another through his head, and in-
stantly expired. His mate soon after-
wards was killed, and the vessel being close-
ly attacked, surrendered. The Conquest
and the privateers were lying in a bay near
Batibeneau.
The French cartel schr. Two Sisters sail-
ed on Wednesday evening for the Mole,
with dispatches from gen. Touffaint.
The vessels in the offing, are his majesty's
ships the Queen, capt. Dublin and Car-
natic, capt. Loring, from a cruise off the
Havannah, in company with the Thunder-
er and Maidstone, during which they have
captured a Spanish and American brig which
are hourly expected, under convoy of the
Grey-Hound frigate.
The schooner Mary, from Norfolk for
this port, with a cargo of Staves and Shin-
gles, sprung a leak to windward of Yallahs,
and was ran ashore by the Captain, the lum-
ber will be saved.
We are informed that the American
ship Zenobia, that failed from this not long
ago, sent armed boats into the place in the
Gaymanas, where the prize to the Conquest
brig was lying with a view to cut her out,
but were obliged, from superior force to
retire.

RICHMOND, January 4.
On Tuesday last, General Pinckney, one
of our late envoys to France, arrived in this
city, with his family, on their way to Charle-
ston, South-Carolina, the place of their resi-
dence. Information having been received,
that General Pinckney was expected in Rich-
mond on that day, Captain Austin's troop of
horse, joined by many respectable citizens on
horseback, marched out and met the General
about five miles from the city, and on their
return were met at Bacon-Branch by captain
Richardson's company of Light Infantry Blues
who having joined in the escort, accompa-
nied the General and his family to the house
of General Marshall, where he had been kind-
ly invited.
Yesterday an elegant entertainment was
given at the Eagle-Tavern, by a number of
respectable citizens, to General Pinckney,
as a testimony of the high respect they en-
ertain of his talents, and of the gratitude
which the many services that he has render-
ed his country, as well as the firm and able
conduct which he displayed during the time
he was employed in endeavoring to treat
with the French directory, have impressed
on their minds.
Gen. Pinckney, we understand, is to leave
Richmond this day, on his way home. We
also learn, that the citizens of Petersburg
are preparing for his reception.

A Philadelphia paper some time ago, in-
formed the public that a new drama, found-
ed on the failure of the negotiation at Paris,
was in preparation, and would, it was ex-

**UNIFORM
For the Army of the UNITED STATES.**
THE uniform of the commander in chief,
to be a blue coat, with yellow buttons, and
gold epaulets, each having three silver stars,
with lining, capes and cuffs, of buff—in win-
ter buff vest and breeches—in summer, a
white vest and breeches of nankeen.—The
coat to be without lappels, and embroidered
on the cape and cuffs and pockets. A white
plume in the hat, to be a further distinction.
The adjutant general, the aids, and secre-
taries, of the commander in chief, to be
likewise distinguished by a white plume.
The uniform of the other general officers,
to be a blue coat, with yellow buttons, gold
epaulets, linings and facings of buff—the
under-clothes the same with those of the
commander in chief.
The major generals to be distinguished by
two silver stars in each epaulet, and except
the inspector general, by a black and white
plume, the black below. The brigadier to
be distinguished by one silver star on each
epaulet, and by a red and white plume, the
red below. The aids, of all general officers,
who are taken from regiments, and the offi-
cers of inspection, to wear the uniforms of
the regiments from which they are taken.
The aids to be severally distinguished by the
like plumes, which are worn by the general
officers, to whom they are respectively at-
tached.
The uniform of the aids of the commander
in chief, when not taken from regiments,
to be a blue coat, with yellow buttons, and
gold epaulet, buff lining and facings—the
same under-clothes with the commander in
chief.
The inspector general, his aids, and the
officers of inspection generally, to be distin-
guished by a blue plume. The quarter mas-
ter general, and other military officers in his
department, to be distinguished by a green
plume.
The uniform of the infantry and artillery
to be a blue coat, with white buttons, and red
facings, white under-clothes and cocked hats
—the length of the officers coats to reach to
the knees, the coats of the infantry to be
lined with white, of the artillery with red.
The uniform of the cavalry, to be a green
coat, with white buttons linings, and facings;
white vest and breeches, and helmet caps.
Each colonel, to be distinguished by two
epaulets; each major, by one epaulet on the
right shoulder, and a strap on the left. All
the field officers, (except as above) and the
regimental staff, to wear red plumes—the
officers of companies are to wear no plumes.
Captains to be distinguished by an epaulet
on the right shoulder; lieutenants by one on
the left shoulder; cadets by a strap on the
right shoulder. The epaulets and straps of
the regimental officers to be of silver.
Serjeant majors and quarter-master ser-
jeants to be distinguished by two red worsted
epaulets; serjeants by a like epaulet on
the right shoulder; corporals by a like epaulet
on the left shoulder; the flank companies to
be distinguished by red wings on the should-
ers.
The coats of the musicians to be of the col-
ours of the facings of the corps to which
they severally belong. The chief musicians
to wear two white worsted epaulets.
All the civil staff of the army, to wear plain
blue coats, with yellow buttons, and white
under-clothes.
No gold or silver lace, except in the epau-
lets and straps, to be worn.
The commissioned officers, and cadets, to
wear swords.
All persons belonging to the army, to
wear a black cockade, with a small white
eagle in the centre. The cockade of non-
commissioned officers, musicians and privates,
to be of leather, with Eagles of tin.
The regiments to be distinguished from
each other, numerically. The number of
each regiment to be expressed on the but-
tons.

the twenty-third year of the Inde-
pendence of the said States.

WHEREAS,
BY an Act of Congress passed on the sixteenth
day of July in the year of our Lord one thou-
sand seven hundred and ninety eight, the Presi-
dent of the United States is authorized to borrow
on behalf of the United States from the
Bank of the United States, or from any other
body or bodies politic or corporate, or from
any person or persons, and upon such terms
and conditions as he shall judge most advan-
tageous for the United States, a sum not
exceeding five millions of dollars, so however,
that no contract or engagement be made which
shall preclude the United States from reimburs-
ing any sum or sums borrowed at any time after
the expiration of fifteen years from the date of
such loan. And whereas, it is declared by the
said Act, that so much as may be necessary of
the surplus of the duties on Imports and Ton-
nage beyond the permanent appropriations hereto-
fore charged upon them by law, shall be pledged
and appropriated for paying the interest, and
also for paying and discharging the principal
sum or sums of all the monies which may be
borrowed, according to the term or terms which
may be fixed, pursuant to the authority afore-
said—And whereas by the said Act, the faith of
the United States is pledged to establish sufficient
permanent Revenues for making up any deficien-
cy that may hereafter appear in the provisions
before-mentioned for paying the interest and
principal sums, or either of them, of any mo-
nies which may be borrowed pursuant to the said
Act. And whereas the President of the United
States did by an Act or Commission under his
hand dated the ninth day of January in the year
one thousand seven hundred and ninety nine, au-
thorize and empower, the Secretary of the Treas-
ury, to borrow on behalf of the United States,
any sum not exceeding in the whole, five mil-
lions of dollars and to make such contract or
contracts as should be necessary, and for the in-
terest of the United States, in pursuance of the
Act of Congress above recited.
Now therefore, the undersigned, Secretary
of the Treasury, in pursuance of the Act of
Congress, and the authority from the President
of the United States, above mentioned, doth
hereby on behalf of the United States of Amer-
ica, contract and engage in manner following,
to wit.

1st. A book for receiving subscriptions to a
Loan of five millions of dollars for the use of
the United States shall be opened in the city
of Philadelphia, at the Bank of the United States
on Thursday the twenty eighth day of February
ensuing, which book shall continue open for the
purpose of receiving subscriptions, until the
whole of the said five millions of dollars shall
be subscribed. If more than five millions of
dollars shall be subscribed on the first day of
opening the said loan, the surplus shall be de-
ducted in proportion to the sums subscribed by
individuals, exceeding four thousand dollars.
2d. For every hundred dollars which may be
subscribed there shall be forthwith deposited and
paid the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents,
and like payments of twelve dollars and fifty
cents, shall be made within the first ten days of
the months of April, May, June, July, August
September and October ensuing. The Secre-
tary of the Treasury however reserves the right
of reducing the number of installments by spe-
cial agreements, with the individuals who may
become subscribers.
3d. On the failure of payment of any install-
ment of the sums subscribed according to the
tenor of the second article, the next preceding
installment of twelve dollars and fifty cents,
which shall have been paid, for every hundred
dollars subscribed shall be forfeited to the Unit-
ed States.
4th. The sums subscribed shall and may be
paid to the credit of the United States, at the
Bank of the United States, or at the offices of
discount and deposit of the said bank at Boston,
New-York, Baltimore, or Charleston, or at ei-
ther of the Banks of Salem, in Massachusetts,
Newport and Providence in Rhode-Island, Hart-
ford in Connecticut, Albany in New-York, or
Alexandria in Virginia, for which payments, the
receipts of the Cashiers of the Offices of Dis-
count and Deposit and of the Banks aforesaid
shall be received at the Bank of the United States
as equivalent to money; but no payment of a
subsequent installment shall be received at any
other place than that where the first install-
ment was paid, except at the Bank of the United
States; in case any deposits shall be made at the
offices of Discount or Deposit, or at either of
the Banks aforesaid, which shall not be applied
to the payment of the first installment of subscrip-
tions to the Loan aforesaid, the said deposits
shall be forthwith refunded by directions from
the Treasury.
5th. For the sum or number of shares of one
hundred dollars, which may be subscribed, cer-
tificates shall be given by the Cashier of the Bank
of the United States, which shall be assignable
by indorsement, and delivery of the parties in
whose favour the said certificates may be issued,
until the completion of the payments required
by the tenor of the second article preceding.
6th. The sums subscribed and paid in pursu-
ance of the tenor of the second article preced-
ing, shall after the said payments have been
completed, constitute a funded capital stock
divisible into shares of one hundred dollars each,
which capital stock shall bear interest at the rate
of eight per centum per annum from the times
fixed for the payment of the respective install-
ments payable quarter yearly at the Treasury
of the United States, or at the Loan Offices where
the same may stand credited, until the last day
of December, in the year one thousand eight
hundred and eight.
7th. After the last day of December in the said
year one thousand eight hundred and eight, and
after reasonable notice to the creditors, which shall
be given by an advertisement in some public new-
spaper, printed at the seat of the government of the
United States, the said capital stock shall be re-
deemable at the pleasure of the United States by
the reimbursement of the whole sum or sums
borrowed, and which may constitute the said capi-
tal stock either at the treasury of the United States
or at the loan offices where the same may stand
credited.
8th. The credits for the said capital stock shall
and may be separately certified in sums either for
one hundred, four hundred, one thousand, four
thousand or ten thousand dollars, and the credits
so certified shall be transferable by the creditors, or
their attorneys, at the Treasury and Loan Offices
respectively, in pursuance of the rules which have
been, or which may be established relative to the
transfer of the funded stock of the United States,
9th. A sufficient sum of the surplus of the duties
on Imports and Tonnage beyond the permanent
appropriations heretofore charged upon them by
law, together with the faith of the United States,
are hereby pledged for the fulfillment of this con-
tract, in pursuance of, and according to the terms
and conditions of the act of Congress herein be-
fore recited.
