AN ACT,
Limiting the time within which claims against the United States, for credits on the books of the Treasury, may be presented for allowance

BE it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America, in Congress assembled, That all credits on the books of the Treasury of the United States, for transactions during the late war, which, according to the course of the Treasury have hitherto been discharged by issuing certificates of registered debt, shall be forever barred and precluded from settlement or allowance, unless claimed by the proper creditors, or their legal representatives, on or before the first day of March, in the year one thousand seven hundred and ninety-nine. And the Secretary of the Treasury is hereby required to cause this Act to be published in one or more of the public papers of each state.

ON the origin, progress and present state of French aggression, with a sketch of the infamous attempts to degrade the Government of the United States, and some reflections on the late proceedings in Congress; written the last of April in the present year, by a Member of the House of Representatives.

For the information of the Citizens, the following extract of an act of Assembly, passed the 13th day of February, 1769, is now re published.

AND be it further enacted by the authority aforesaid, That if any person or persons, shall, after the publication hereof, presume to cast, carry, draw out, or lay any dead horse, or other dead carcase of cattle, sheep, hog or dog, or any excrement or filth from vaults, privies or necessary houses, and shall leave such carcase, carrion or filth, without burying the same, a sufficient depth in the ground, on any part of the commons of the said city, or on or near any streets, lanes, alleys or highways, within the said city, district or township adjoining the same, every person or persons so offending and being convicted thereof, or any justice of the peace of the city or county of Philadelphia, respectively, shall forfeit and pay for every such offence, the sum of thirty shillings.

Agreeably to a resolution of the Select and Common Councils, dated the 10th of January 1799,
Notice is hereby given,
That a FIT or HOLE, is now prepared on the west side of Fifth Street, from Schuylkill, between Vine and Sassafras streets.

And one other FIT or HOLE, is opened on the west side of Fifth street, from Schuylkill, between Walnut and Spruce streets, where all filth or excrement from vaults or privies, of the city of Philadelphia, shall be deposited. Late Foreign Articles

LONDON, November 16.
The American agents are at this time very busy in buying up ships to be converted into ships of force; several of the French, Dutch, and Spanish prizes lately taken, have been purchased by them, and are, with permission of government, gone into private docks to be repaired, and fitted out with all possible dispatch.

The Duke of Devonshire and Earl Moira have set a laudable example in Ireland, by resolving, that they will let no estates in future to what are termed middle men, but that the real occupiers shall be the only lessees of their respective farms.

Lady Nelson has taken a house at Bath, for the reception for her gallant Lord, who is shortly expected to arrive in England.

Letters from Hamburg say, that Dumourier, with several officers who have followed under him have been induced, by advantageous offers, to enter into the service of the Ottoman Porte. It is added, that Dumourier and suite are upon the eve of taking their departure for Constantinople.

The remittances to this country from the Continent have of late been so great, that there is at this moment more cash in the Bank, than there has been at any period since the commencement of the war.

The price of Salt Petre has lately advanced near 60 per cent. Several articles of drugs are also increased lately beyond all precedent.

Yesterday arrived in town several of the Officers who came over in the late cartel ship from France. They report that the French government are in a state of the utmost alarm, in consequence of the tumults which have broken out in the Netherlands, and that troops are pouring towards the Flemish frontier from every quarter.

They also report, that on passing from Lille to Gravelines, on the 16th inst. a very heavy cannonade was heard in the direction of Courtray, in the neighbourhood of which town, it is supposed an action had taken place between the military and the people.

DUBLIN, Nov. 13.

Private Letter.
This day the famous Holt, who surrendered to Lord Powerscourt, on terms of transportation for life, was brought to the Castle in a post-chaise, and escorted by the Powerscourt yeoman cavalry. He is a very good looking tall man, and was dressed in a military uniform—scarlet faced with blue, and a blue military great coat. The capture of Buonaparte could not create greater exultation here or be more generally the subject of conversation.

Trial of Theobald Wolfe Tone.
The Trial of T. W. Tone by a Court Martial at the Barrack, of which general Loftus was President, is concluded.

Tone being asked, whether he was guilty or not of the charge of having as a false Traitor entered into the Service of the Enemy, and appeared in Arms against his Sovereign? replied, That he would give the Court no trouble—That he fully admitted the charge.

He then read a kind of Defence, in doing which he was at three different inflammatory passages stopped by the Court, and suffered to erase the obnoxious parts out of the Paper.

The general tendency of this paper was that he confessed having entered into the French service (and he produced his commission of Chief de Brigade); that he had embarked in the great design of raising three millions of his own fellow subjects from a state of bondage; that he had made the same attempt in which Washington had succeeded, and Kosciuszko had failed; to the Catholics of Ireland he acknowledged his obligations; he had engaged sincerely in their service, and had been amply remunerated; the connection of Ireland with Great Britain he had ever considered as her bane, and he had acted under that conviction to rescue his country; success he could not command, and he was prepared to meet his fate.

As a soldier, however, he wished to die like a soldier; he wished as an emigrant taken in arms, to be treated as the French had treated the Count de Sombitieu, and to be shot; the sooner his fate was to take place, the better; he wished it might be within an hour.

He was then remanded to prison, and the Court proceeded to discuss the sentences, which was sent to the Lord Lieutenant for his approbation, and has not yet transpired.
