

City Commiflioner's Office,
 January 15, 1799.
 For the information of the Citizens, the following
 extract of an act of Assembly, passed the
 18th day of February, 1769, is now re-
 published.

Sec. 43. AND be it further enacted by the au-
 thority aforesaid, That if any per-
 son or persons, shall, after the publication hereof,
 presume to call, carry, draw out, or by any dead
 horse, or other dead carcass of cattle, sheep, hog or
 dog, or any excrement or filth from vaults, privies,
 carriage or filth, without burying the same, a suffi-
 cient depth in the ground, on any part of the commons
 of the said city, or on or near any streets, lanes,
 alleys or highways, within the said city, district or
 township adjoining the same, every person or per-
 sons so offending and being convicted thereof, be-
 fore any justice of the peace of the city or county
 of Philadelphia, respectively, shall forfeit and pay
 for every such offence, the sum of thirty shillings.
 A greably to a resolution of the said and Com-
 mon Councils, dated the 10th of January 1799,
 Notice is hereby given,

That a PIR or HOLE, is now prepared on the
 west side of Fifth street, from Schuykill, between
 Vine and Saffras streets.
 And one other PIR or HOLE, is sprung on the
 west side of Fifth street, from Schuykill, between
 Walnut and Spruce streets, where all filth or ex-
 crement from vaults or privies, of the city of Phila-
 delphia, shall be deposited. Wherefore, if any
 person or persons shall be found transgressing, they
 must expect to be punished as the law directs, and
 that the same will be strictly enforced.

W H E R E A S,

BY an Act of Congress passed on the sixteenth
 day of July in the year of our Lord one thou-
 sand seven hundred and ninety eight, the Pre-
 sident of the United States is authorized to borrow
 on behalf of the United States from any other
 body or bodies politic or corporate, or from
 any person or persons, and upon such terms
 and conditions as he shall judge most advan-
 tageous for the United States, a sum not
 exceeding five millions of dollars, so however,
 that no contract or engagement be made which
 shall preclude the United States from reimburse-
 ment any sum or sums borrowed at any time after
 the expiration of fifteen years from the date of
 the said Act, and so much as may be necessary of
 the surplus of the duties on Imports and Ton-
 nage beyond the permanent appropriations here-
 tofore charged upon them by law, shall be pledged
 and appropriated for paying the interest, and
 also for paying and discharging the principal
 sum or sums of all the moneys which may be
 borrowed, according to the term or terms which
 may be fixed, pursuant to the authority afore-
 said—And whereas by the said Act, the faith of
 the United States is pledged to establish sufficient
 permanent Revenues for making up any deficiency
 that may hereafter appear in the provisions
 before-mentioned for paying the interest and
 principal sums, or either of them, of any mo-
 nies which may be borrowed pursuant to the said
 Act. And whereas the President of the United
 States did by an Act or Commission under his
 hand dated the ninth day of January in the year
 one thousand seven hundred and ninety nine, au-
 thorize and empower, the Secretary of the Treas-
 ury, to borrow on behalf of the United States,
 any sum not exceeding in the whole, five mil-
 lions of dollars and to make such contract or
 contracts as should be necessary, and for the inter-
 est of the United States, in pursuance of the

 opening the said loan, the surplus shall be de-
 ducted in proportion to the sums subscribed by
 individuals, exceeding four thousand dollars.

2d. For every hundred dollars which may be
 subscribed there shall be forthwith deposited and
 paid the sum of twelve dollars and fifty cents,
 and like payments of twelve dollars and fifty
 cents, shall be made within the first ten days
 of the months of April, May, June, July, August
 September and October ensuing. The Secretary

5th. For the sum or number of shares of one
 hundred dollars, which may be subscribed, cer-
 tificates shall be given by the Cashier of the Bank

 by indorsement, and delivery of the parties in
 whose favour the said certificates may be issued,
 until the completion of the payments required
 by the tenor of the second article preceding.

6th. The sum subscribed and paid in pursu-
 ance of the tenor of the second article preced-
 ing, shall after the said payments have been
 completed, constitute a funded capital stock
 divisible into shares of one hundred dollars each,
 which capital stock shall bear interest at the rate
 of eight per centum per annum from the times
 fixed for the payment of the respective instal-
 ments payable quarterly yearly at the Treasury
 of the United States, or at the Loan Offices where
 the same may stand credited, until the last day
 of December, in the year one thousand eight
 hundred and eight.

7th. After the last day of December in the said
 year one thousand eight hundred and eight, and
 after reasonable notice to the creditors, which shall
 be given by an advertisement in some public news-
 paper, printed at the seat of the government of the
 United States, the said capital stock shall be re-
 deemable at the pleasure of the United States by
 the reimbursement of the whole sum or sums
 borrowed, and which may constitute the said cap-
 ital stock either at the treasury of the United States
 or at the loan offices where the same may stand
 credited.

8th. The credits for the said capital stock shall
 and may be separately certified in sums either for
 one hundred, four hundred, one thousand, four
 thousand or ten thousand dollars, and the credits
 so certified shall be transferable by the creditors, or
 their attorneys, at the Treasury and Loan Offices
 respectively, in pursuance of the rules which have
 been, or which may be established relative to the
 transfer of the funded stock of the United States.

9th. A sufficient sum of the surplus of the duties
 on Imports and Tonnage beyond the permanent
 appropriations heretofore charged upon them by
 law, together with the faith of the United States
 are hereby pledged for the fulfillment of this con-
 tract, in pursuance of, and according to the terms
 and conditions of the act of Congress herein be-
 fore recited.
