4th, The fums subscribed shall and may be paid to the credit of the United States, at the Bank of the United States, or at the offices of discount and deposit of the said Bank at Boston, New-York, Baltimore, or Charleston, or at either of the Banks of Salem, in Massachusetts, are providence in Rhode-Island, Hartford in Connecticut, Albany in New-York, or Alexandria in Virginia, for which payments, the receipts of the Cashiers of the Offices of Discount and Deposit and of the Banks aforesaid shall be received at the Bank of the United States as equivalent to money; but no payment of a nail be received at the Bank of the United States 2s equivalent to money; but no payment of a subsequent installment shall be received at any other place than that where the first installment was paid, except at the Bank of the United States; in case any deposits shall be made at the offices of Discount or Deposit, or at either of the Banks aforesaid, which shall not be applied to the payment of the first installment of subscriptions to the Loan aforesaid, the said deposits shall be forthwith refunded by directions from the Treasury.

5th. For the sums or number of shares of one hundred dollars, which may be subscribed, certificates shall be given by the Cashier of the Bank of the United States, which shall be affignable by indorfement, and delivery of the parties in whose favour the said certificates may be issued, until the compulstion of the payments required.

whole favour the faid certificates may be iffued, until the completion of the payments required by the tenor of the fecond article preceeding.

6th. The furns fublcribed and paid in purisance of the tenor of the fecond article preceding, shall after the faid payments have been compleated, constitute a funded capital stock divisible into shares of one hundred dollars each, which capital stock shall bear interest at the rate of eight per centum per annuar from the fire of eight per centum per annum from the times fixed for the payment of the respective installments payable quarter yearly at the Treasury of the United States, or at the Loan Offices where the same may stand credited, until the last day of December, in the year one thousand eighthundred and eight.

7th. After the last day of December in the faid year one thousand eight hundred and eight, and after reasonable notice to the creditors, which shall be given by an advertisement in some public newspaper, printed at the sea of the government of the United States, the said capital stock shall be redeemable at the pleasure of the United States by the reimbursement of the whole sum or sum borrowed, and which may constitute the said capital stock either at the treasury of the United States or at the loan offices where the same may stand credited.

8th. The credits for the faid capital flock shall and may be separately certified in sums either for one hundred, sour hundred, one thousand, sour thousand or ten thousand dollars, and the credits so certified shall be transferable by the creditors, or their atternies, at the Treasury and Loan Offices respectively, in pursuance of the rules which have been, or which may be attablished relative to the transfer of the funded shock of the United States, oth. A sufficient sum of the surplus of the duries on Imports and Tonnage beyond the permanent appropriations heretofore charged upon them, or law, together with the saith of the United States are hereby pledged for the sulfishment of this contract, in pursuance of, and according to the terms and conditions of the act of Congress herein before recited.
