AT the request of Dr. Hall, we do here y certify, that on the 22d day of March, Major Jackfon, in company with feveral Cuftom-Houle officers, came on board the hip Thomas Wilfon, then at anchor below the fort, after remaining nearly half an hour and drinking feveral glaffes of wine with the captain and paffengers, being informed of the flate of the lhip and crew, he was afked by Mr. Williams if it was necessary to ftop

I do certify and declare, that about the 23d of laft month, I met Dr. Hall in Chef. nut near Fifth-lirect, and that the Doctor nformed me in a ferious and unqualified manner, that there was a confirmed cafe of the Yellow Fever on board of a veffel which he had that day vifited, and ordered down the river to perform quarantine.—Which information I flated to leveral members of the Senate and Houle of Reprefentatives of this flate immediately after receiving it from the doctor-and which I alfo flated in my place in the house of representatives. With a view, no doubt, to repel any po-sitive tellimony which might be brought against Dr. Hall's negative affertion and oath, he obtains a most curious negative certificate from his colleague, Dr. Samuel Duffield, confulting Phylician for the Port of Phila-

If the two doctors will procure fome perfon to inform them what is underflood by a negative quantity in Algebra, they may form a tolerable guess what is likely to be the re-ception, by the public, which is pretty math-ematical in its deductions of their negative fertion, oath, and certificate.

I shall only premise to the confulting phy-fician, that I think his negative certificate will pass for just about as much, as the refi-dent physician's negative oath and affertion will, when confronted by the politive teftimony, which has been adduced to contradict

The fubferibers declare they do not beheve major Jackfon was more than five mi-nutes in the round-houfe, and that although they were fo clofe as almost to touch him the they were to clote as almost to touch min the whole time he was there, they did not hear him fay that he did not believe the fhip ought to flop at the Hofpital—on the contrary, the pilot gave a politive affurance to captain Roach that he would not bring the fhip up until fhe had been vifited. Before we quitted the fhip, Major Jackfon told the fublicribers that the bad fmell had affurded him ware much.
