THAT the track of Land herein after deferibed, namely, "beginning at the North West corner of the seven ranges of townships, and running thence sifty miles due south, along the western boundary of the said ranges;—thence due West to the Main Branch of the scioto river; thence up the Main Branch of the scioto river; thence up the Main Branch of the said river to the place where the Indian boundary line crosses the same;—thence along the said boundary line to the Tuscaroras branch of the Muskingum river at the crossing place above Fort Lawrence; thence down the said river, to the point where a line run due west from the place of beginning, will intersect the said river; thence along the line so run to the place of beginning;" has been divided into townships of five miles square, and sractional parts of townships; and that plats and surveys of the said townships and fractional parts of townships and sactional parts of townships are deposited in the offices of the Register of the Treasury and Surveyor General, for the inspection of all persons concerned. THAT the tract of Land herein after detion of all persons concerned.

The holders of fuch warrants as have been The holders of fuch warrants as have been or shall be granted for military services performed during the late war, are required to present the same to the Register of the Treasury, at some time prior to the twelfth day of February in the year, one thousand eight hundred, for the purpose of being registered; No registry will however be made of any less quantity than a quarter township, or four thousand acres.

The priority of location of the warrants which may be preferred and regillered in manner afore-faid, prior to the 12th day of February in the year one thousand eight hundred, will immediately after the faid day, be determined by lot, in the mode drescribed by the act first recited.

IV.

The holders of registered warrants, shall on Menday the 17th day of February, in the year 1800, in the order of which the priority of location shall be determined by lot as aforefaid, personally, or by their agents, designate in writing at the office of the Register of the Treasury, the particular quarter townships elected by them respectively and such of the said holders as shall not designate their locations on the said day, shall be postponed in locating such warrants to all other holders of registered warrants.

The holders of warrants for military fervice or tracks of four thousand acres each; shall, at a time after Monday the 17th day of February, 18 and prior to the first day of January, 1802, be lowed to register the faid warrants in mannet foresaid, and forthwith to make locations there any tract or tracts of land not before loss

All warrants or claims for lands on account of military fervices, which shall not be registered and located before the first day of January, 1802, are by the supplementary act of Congress herein below recited, passed on the second day of March, 1799 declared to be forever barred.
