GENERAL ORDERS.

THE following disposition of the two regiments of Artillerists and Engineers has been adopted. Of the first regiment, one battalion commanded by major Rivardi, is assigned to the Western army; another battalion commanded by major Freeman, is to garrison the posts in Georgia and South Carolina; another battalion commanded by major Ford, is to garrison the posts in North Carolina, Virginia and Maryland; and the remaining battalion commanded by major Touffard, is reserved for the service of the field.

Of the second regiment, one battalion commanded by major Brooks, is to garrison the posts in Delaware, Pennsylvania, New-Jersey, and New-York; another battalion commanded by major Jackson, is to garrison the posts in Connecticut, Rhode-Island, Massachusetts and New-Hampshire, and the remaining battalion (one not having yet been raised) commanded by major Hoops, is reserved for the service of the field.

The definitive arrangements of officers to the respective companies of the battalions of the first regiment, annexed to the Western army is referred to Colonel Burbeck.

The following is established with respect to the other bat alions. Of that commanded by major Freeman one company is to be officered by Michael Kalterlein, capt. George Izard, and Jonathan Robeson, lieutenants; another by Abimeel Y. Nicoll captain, William Morris and Howell Cobb lieutenants; another by John McCielland captain, Robert Rowan and Straits Rutledge lieutenants; another by Frederick Frye captain, Horatio Dayton and Samuel Fowles lieutenants.

Of that commanded by major Ford, one company is to be officered by Richard S. Blackburn capt. John Saunders and James Triplett lieutenants; another by James Bruff captain, Henry Mahlenburg and James P. Heath lieutenants; another by Ebenezer Massey captain, Ebenezer Beebe lieutenant; another by Sams Morris captain, Philip Landai and Samuel T. Dyson lieutenants.

Of that commanded by George Touffard, one company is to be officered by George Ingersoll capt. Peter A. Darnly lieutenant; another by William Littlefield captain, George Ross lieutenant; another by Joseph Elliott captain, James Houff and William Yates lieutenants; another by Nemesiah Freeman captain, Philip Rodrigue and Warham Shepherd lieutenants.

The arrangement with respect to the second regiment is as follows. Of the battalion commanded by major Brooks one company is to be officered by James Reed, capt. Theodore Memminger and Robert W. Osborne lieutenants; another by Callender Irvine captain, George W. Carmichael and Charles Wollencraft lieutenants; another by James Still captain, Philip Stewart and Patrick C. Harris lieutenants; another by Walter L. Cochran captain, William L. Cooper and Robert Heaton, jun. lieutenants.

Of that commanded by major Jackson one company is to be officered by Decius Wardworth capt. Nathaniel Leonard and Francis Gibson lieutenants; another by John Henry captain, John W. Livingston and T. Knight lieutenants; another by Lenuel Gates captain, George W. Duncan and George Warchouse lieutenants; another by Amos Steadard captain, William Steele and Leonard Williams lieutenants.

Of that commanded by major Touffard, one company is to be officered by William M. Rhea captain James White and John Ferguson, jun. lieutenants; another by Samuel Eddins captain, Alexander D. Pope and John Laybourn lieutenants; another by Francis H. Flager captain, William Deveaux and James B. May lieutenants; another by John Bishop captain, John Hancock and David Evans, jun. lieutenants.

It is expected that the officers not at present with their companies, and not on the recruiting service, or on some other service, by the special command of major general Hamilton, will immediately join them; and the companies not already at the aforesaid destinations, are to be held in readiness to proceed to them, for which further orders will shortly be given.

It is expected the proposals will also extend to the supply of rum, whiskey, or other ardent spirits at the rate of half a gallon per ration, and Vinegar at the rate of two quarts for every hundred rations. The proposals will specify the price of the several component parts of the ration, as well as those of substitutes or alternatives for parts thereof.

The rations are to be furnished in such quantities as that there shall at all times, during the term of the proposed contracts, be sufficient for the consumption of the troops at Michilimackinac, Detroit, Niagara and Onwego, for six months in advance, and at each of the other posts on the western waters, for at least three months in advance, of good and wholesome provisions, if the same shall be required. It is also to be permitted to all and every

of the commanders of fortified places, or posts to call for at season, when the same can be transported, or at any time in case of emergency, such supplies of the provisions in advance, as in the discretion of the commander shall be deemed proper. It is to be understood that the contractor is to be at the expense and risk of issuing the supplies to the troops, and that all losses, sustained, by the depredations of an enemy, or by reason of the troops of the United States, shall be paid for at the price of the article captured or destroyed, and the depositions of two or more persons of credible characters, and the certificate of a commissioned officer, ascertaining the circumstances of the loss, and the amount of the articles, for which compensation shall be claimed.

The privilege is to be understood to be reserved to the United States of requiring, that none of the supplies which may be furnished under any of the proposed contracts shall be issued, until the supplies which have or may be furnished under contracts now in force have been consumed, and that a supply in advance may be always required at any of the fixed posts on the Sea-board or Indian frontiers not exceeding three months.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN Pursuant to the act of Congress, passed on the 11th day of June, one thousand seven hundred and ninety six, entitled "an act for settling the grants of land appropriated for military services, and for the society of United Brethren for propagating the gospel among the Heathen;" and the act supplementary thereto, the said recited act passed on the 10th day of March, one thousand seven hundred and ninety nine—

I. THAT the tract of Land herein after described, namely, beginning at the North-east corner of the seven ranges of townships, running thence five miles due North, along the western boundary of the said ranges, thence due West to the Main Branch of the Schuylkill river to the place where the Indian boundary crosses the same—thence along the Indian boundary line to the Tulocorav branch of the Schuylkill river at the crossing place above Lawrence; thence down the said branch of the river to a point where a line run due West from the corner of beginning, will intersect the said branch thence along the line to run to the place of beginning;" has been divided into townships five miles square, and fractional parts of townships; and that plats and surveys of the said townships and fractional parts of townships deposited in the office of the Register of the Treasury and Surveyor General, for the distribution of all persons concerned.

II. The holders of such warrants as have been or shall be granted for military services, and during the late war, are required to register the same to the Register of the Treasury, in the year, one thousand eight hundred, for the purpose of being registered: No warrant will however be made of any less quantity than a quarter township, or four thousand acres.

III. The priority of location of the warrants may be preferred and registered in manner aforesaid, prior to the 12th day of February, one year one thousand eight hundred, will terminate after the said day; be determined by lot, in the mode prescribed by the said first recited act.

IV. The holders of registered warrants, filed Monday the 17th day of February, in the year 1800, in the order of which the priority of location shall be determined by lot, shall be preferred, or by their agents, delegates or attorneys in office of the Register of the Treasury, the particular quarter townships claimed by them, and such of the said holders as shall not desire to locate their warrants on the said day, shall be preferred in locating such warrants to all other holders of registered warrants.

V. The holders of warrants for military services, sufficient to cover one or more quarter townships, or tracts of four thousand acres each, shall, at any time after Monday the 17th day of February, 1800, and prior to the first day of January, 1801, be allowed to register the said warrants in manner aforesaid, and forthwith to make location thereon, on any tract, or tracts of land not before located.

VI. All warrants or claims for Indian services or military services, which have not been located before the first day of January, 1801, being the supplementary act of Congress, herein before recited, passed on the second day of March, 1799, declared to be forever barred.
