Note 2. Half an hour shall be allowed for opening and closing the Mail at all Offices where no particular time is specified.

Note 3. For every hour's delay (unavoidable accidents excepted) in arriving after the times prefixed in any contract, the contractor shall forfeit one dollar, and if the delay continue until the departure of any depending Mail, lose a trip, an additional forfeiture of five dollars shall be incurred.

Note 4. Newspapers as well as Letters are to be sent in the Mails; and if any person making proposals desires to carry Newspapers other than those conveyed in the mail, for his own emolument, he shall state in his proposals for what sum he will carry it with this emolument and for what sum without that emolument.

Note 5. Should any person making proposals desire an alteration of the times of arrival and departure above specified, he shall state in his proposals the alterations desired, and the difference they will make in the terms of his contract.
