We, therefore, respectfully solicit, as the publication is necessary to be disseminated among public bodies, that Congress will, in their wisdom, render him such additional encouragement, to the which he has obtained from private individuals, as to enable him to proceed with the work, to the your Memorialists may be enabled to purchase copies of that record for themselves.

RESOLVED by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, I has the Secretary of the Senate and the Clerk of the House of Representatives, authorized and directed, to subscribe, on such terms as they may deem eligible, for the use of the Senate and House of Representatives, for four hundred Copies of the Journals of Congress, which are proposed to be published by Richard Folwell and his number of copies of deficient volumes of the same now in print, as may be necessary to complete the same.

JONATHAN DAYTON, Speaker of the House of Representatives. JAMES ROSS, President of the Senate pro tempore. Approved, March 2d, 1799. JOHN ADAMS, President of the United States. MAY 20. 1799

AT a Court of Common Pleas held at Union Town, for the county of Fayette, the fourth Monday of June, in the year of our Lord on thousand seven hundred and ninety nine, before the Judges of the same court, on the petition of John Willson, praying that the ass of Affirmity, providing that the person of a debtor shall not be liable to imprisonment for debt after delivering up his estate for the use of his creditors, may be extended to him.
