

Foreign Intelligence.

RATISBON, September 19. On the 18th the diet published the opinion of the empire, on the renewal of the war and the duties of its members in furnishing their contingents and granting the Roman months, which is in substance as follows.

After due consideration of the Imperial decree of commission of the 17th of July, it was resolved to return thanks to his Imperial majesty for his paternal care and protection; that the empire in general was fully convinced of the necessity of recommencing the war, in consequence of the hostilities of the French, carried on even during the negotiations at Rastadt; and that therefore a due observance of those regulations, which were found necessary since the beginning of the war, ought again to take place, by which all members of the empire were bound to give all assistance in their power to defend their country; to renounce all private views and to make every necessary sacrifice, that they should furnish their quintuple contingents, in such a manner as to be able to repel and ward off every attack of the enemy. To obtain this great object, the empire should grant 100 Roman months, to defray the expenses of war; payable at three different periods, of six weeks each, commencing from the day of the publication of the Imperial ratification.

September 22. On concluding the deliberations of the diet, the elector of Brunswick, as has already been stated, kept the journals open, without wishing, however, to prevent a conclusion, which afterwards took place, before the instructions of the ambassador had arrived, and which he could not, therefore, enter upon the journals, but communicated them to the diet, by addressing it nearly in the following manner:—"The situation of his majesty's possessions in Germany was such in the present state of affairs, as to be exposed to an invasion from different quarters, and at such a distance from the army of the empire, that they could not well be protected and defended by it; his majesty had therefore, been obliged to take a step, sanctioned by the constitution of the empire, namely, to employ his contingent, and every thing connected with it, along with others of his troops, for the protection and security of his states, and those of other members of the empire, in the circles of lower Saxony, the lower Rhine, and Westphalia, and thus to secure a considerable part of the German empire, for the good of the whole, against all danger with which they were threatened by the enemy. His majesty being still in the same situation, he is nevertheless, not inclined to neglect his other duties as a member of the German empire."

FRANKFORT, September 28. The force of the army in Switzerland, which is opposed to Massena's army, is estimated at 100,000 men, including the troops under general Nauendorf and the Russian which are on their march from Italy; the Italian army under Melas, which is now joined by the corps of B-legrade and Hadick, is stated to amount to 70,000 men.

CINCINNATI. At a meeting of the Pennsylvania State Society of the Cincinnati, held at the State House, in Philadelphia, on the 21st of December, 1799, BRIGADIER GEN. MACPHERSON IN THE CHAIR, The following Resolutions were moved by Major JACKSON, and unanimously adopted: Resolved, That, in veneration of the exalted virtues, patriotism, and public services of our late most excellent, beloved, and ever to be lamented President General, George Washington, and as a tribute of the deepest respect, and most affectionate attachment to his endeared and illustrious memory, the Members of this Society will wear mourning, connected with the Badge of the Society, during six months.

Resolved, That a strip of black Ribband passing along the centre of the Ribband of the Order, be added on this occasion. The following resolutions were moved by Gen. Macpherson and unanimously adopted: Resolved, That Major Jackson be requested to prepare and pronounce an Eulogium on the character of General Washington, embracing a summary review of his Civil and Military services; and that the same be delivered before this Society on Saturday the 23d day of February next, at one o'clock, P. M. at such place as the Standing Committee to whom the arrangements of the day are referred, shall determine.

Resolved, That the President of the United States and his Family—the Vice President of the United States, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the Members of both Houses of Congress, the Heads of Departments, the Judiciary, and such other officers of the General and State Governments as may then be in Philadelphia, be respectfully invited to honor the Society with their presence on the occasion.
